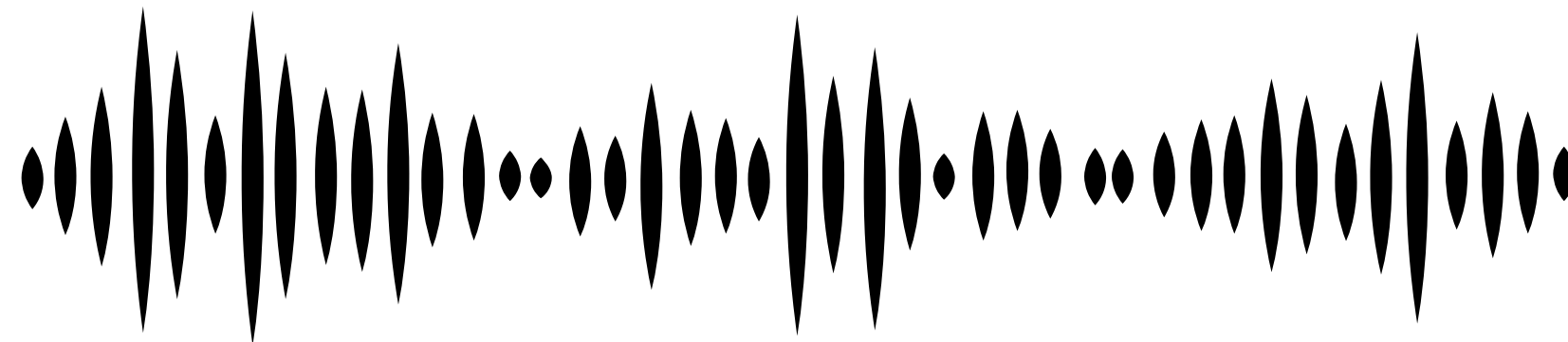

4. Bookmark this site so you can easily return to it at any time.

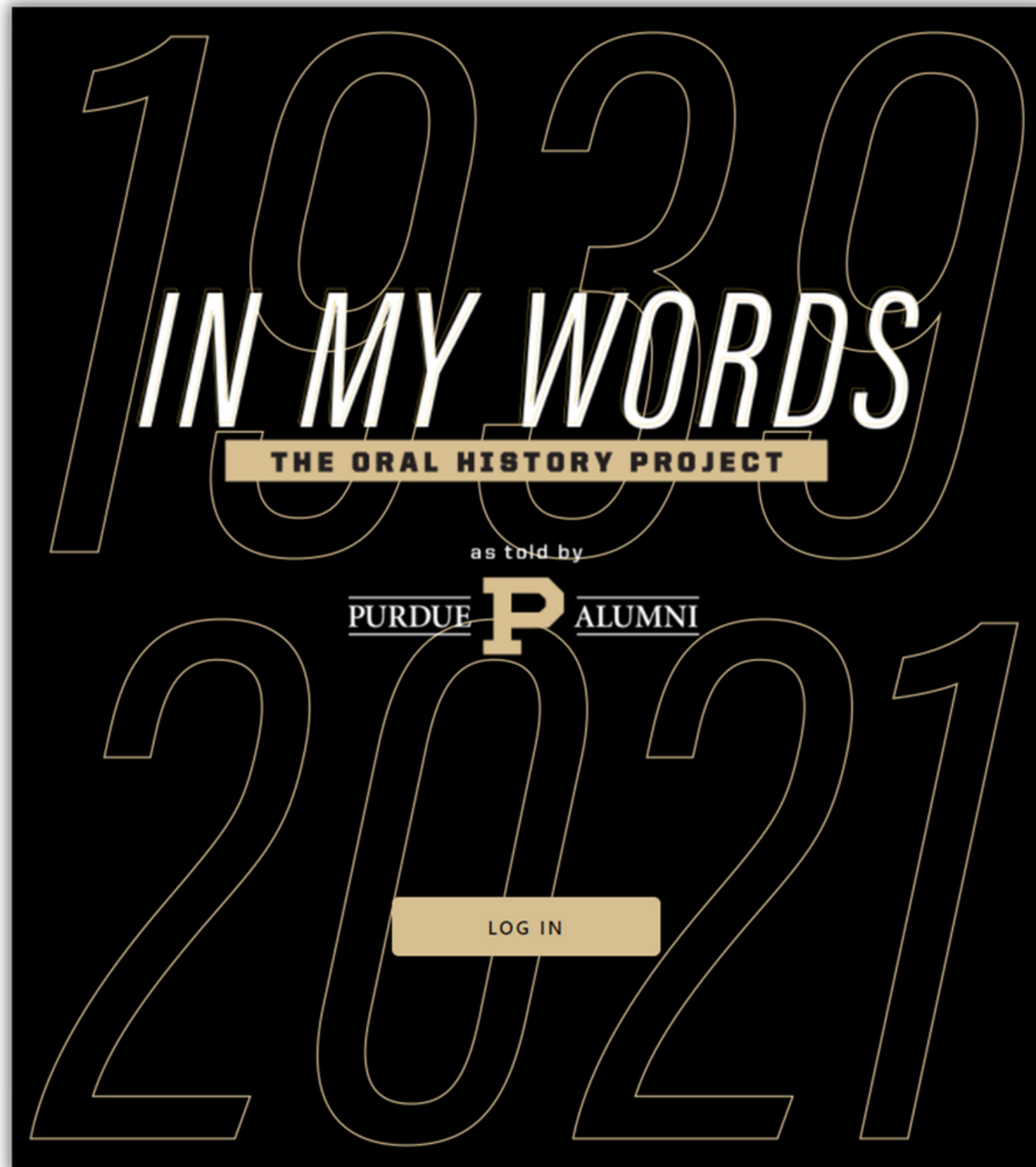

The main page of the Digital Publication is a random assortment of stories from the various chapters and will change each time you visit. You can click on any story to view the entire story, listen to the audio, and/or view the photos that person submitted.

This will tell you which Chapter any given story appears under.

I went to the New York Institute of Technology and had a good career: worked for IBM at the Space Guidance Center on the moon landing, developing the onboard launch guidance computer for NASA. Then, I came back to Grumman Aircraft Engineering and worked on the space shuttle program because they used the Gulfstream. In business aviation, I traveled all over the world with clients, such as the CEOs of General Motors, and even met the founder, Mr. Charles Stewart Mott. I was also on the USS Ranger off Vietnam for six months during the war. It all started with New York Tech and taking opportunities whenever they came along.
