



### FRIDAY, MAY 8, 1891.

The Convention was opened by the President at 10 A. M., after which the records of the previous meetings were read and approved.

# APPENDIX.

# THE ANNUAL COMMUNICATION OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL TO THE CONVENTION OF 1891.

I. New Chapters. The applications for Chapters at the Universities of Pennsylvania and Minnesota were granted in April.

The petitioners from Pennsylvania having applied to the Fraternity to be relieved from the full performance of the conditions imposed by Gen. Res. No. 11 of 1888, the application was referred to the Chapters by the Council, and was speedily granted. The new Tau Chapter was accordingly initiated at Philadelphia on the evening of May 5, 1891, with thirty-four charter members, including all members of the Upsilon Kappa Society of the University of Pennsylvania, who have became associated with the original petitioners since 1888. The Chapter occupies a comfortable and handsomely equipped house in a most advantageous position at the intersection of Thirty-sixth and Locust streets and Woodland avenue, Philadelphia, opposite the main building of the University.

The petitioners from Minnesota will probably be initiated on or about May 22d. They have proposed to assume the name of Theta Phi, from the name of their provisional organization. The Chapter will have ninety-one charter members, some of whom, however, are already active members of the Fraternity, having passed from the University of Minnesota to colleges represented in the Fraternity.

It is believed that the new Chapters, from the character of their membership and of their Universities, as well as from the patience and persistence with which they have maintained the purpose of their organization in spite of discouragement, display an inherent strength, which will make them valuable additions to Psi Upsilon.

II. APPLICATIONS FOR CHARTERS. In accordance with the resolution of the Convention of 1890, the Council appointed Daniel G. Thompson (Gamma, '69), Robert Lenox Belknap (Lambda, '69), Frank L. Hall (Beta, '71) a committee to inquire as to the advisability of establishing a Chapter at Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pennsylvania. Their report is herewith submitted.

An application for the establishment of a Chapter at the Massachusetts

Institute of Technology, Boston, Massachusetts, has been received by the Council, and is herewith submitted with accompanying documents.

III. The Psi. Under General Resolution No. 10 of 1890, the Executive Council by one of its members made a careful investigation of the affairs of the Psi. They found that owing to the greatly increased interest on the part of the graduate members of that Chapter a large part of the liabilities of the Chapter had been paid; that the perils which threatened the Chapter at the time of the last Convention had been safely passed; the prospects of the Chapter were much brighter than they had been before in years; the Chapter house, with a few contemplated repairs and renovations, would be very attractive; and that with the confidently anticipated improvement in the College itself the future of the Chapter would be fully assured. The total unsecured balance of the liabilities of the Trustees of the Chapter at the time of the report was but \$1,100, and there was no danger that that amount would not be raised as rapidly as required. The appointment of a Committee to co operate with the active members of that Chapter was therefore found unnecessary.

IV. MEMBERSHIP. The active membership of the Fraternity on February 1, 1891, as reported, was 444, an increase of 22 over the membership of 1890.

V. THE TENTH CATALOGUE. There has been a moderate demand for the catalogue during the year. Three copies have been sold and two given away, the latter having been taken from the number allotted to the editor for exchange and complimentary distribution.

The Iota, Psi and Eta Chapters have accepted the terms for the settlement of their catalogue assessments prescribed by General Resolution No. 9 of 1890, and have paid their first installments. Credit has not been given to the Psi in the Treasurer's statement, which necessarily went to press before payment was made.

VI. New Song Book. The preparation of the manuscript of the Song Book is nearly completed and is partly in the hands of the printer. The Council has employed Mr. H. P. Main, of New York, to assist Professor Harrington, the editor, as an expert in the compilation of works of this kind, particularly in regard to proof reading, copyrights and the preparation and arrangement of the musical text. The Council is informed that the book will doubtless be ready for delivery in September. The estimated cost of an edition of 1,000 copies is about \$1,725, details of which are herewith submitted Such an edition at a price of not less than \$1.75 per copy is recommended. An immediate sale of 450 copies at from \$1.75 to \$2 per copy will enable the Council, with other available funds in the Treasury, to pay all bills without inconvenience; but it is essential for this end that the Chapters shall be prepared early in September without fail to take and pay for the copies for which they have subscribed.

The Convention of 1890 required the Chapters to notify the Council by June 15, 1890, of the number of Song Books they would agree to take. No response has yet been received from the Iota, Phi, Chi or Eta. Sub-

scriptions have been received, as follows: Theta, 31; Delta, 50; Beta, 15; Sigma, 10; Gamma, 30; Zeta, 15; Lambda, 20; Kappa, 25; Psi, 10 (at a price not exceeding \$1 each); Xi, 92; Upsilon, 15; Pi, 50; Beta Beta, 23; total, 386.

VII. FINANCES. The Treasurer's report is hereto annexed. The treasury has been in good condition, and the gradual accumulation of funds during preceding years enables the Fraternity to provide for the large outlay now required for the Song Book without an assessment or other extra demands upon individual members or Chapters.

A tax of \$1 per active member, to be applied to the general purposes of the Fraternity, is recommended for the ensuing year.
