# ANNUAL CONVENTION TO MARK XI'S 110TH ANNIVERSARY

**W**ESLEYAN UNIVERSITY, Middletown, Connecticut, was only twelve years old when the Xi, the tenth Chapter of Psi Upsilon to be founded, began its glorious contribution to local campus and to national fraternity life.

The Xi has been represented on the Executive Council almost continuously since its establishment in 1869. Charles W. Smiley, '74, served during the period, 1876-84, most of the time as Secretary and Treasurer. George S. Coleman, '76, had the longest tenure, from 1896 to 1921, as Secretary. A. Avery Hallock, '16, who served from 1924 to 1937, was Archivist of the Fraternity from 1930 to the end of his term on the Council. Robert I. Laggren, '13, has been a Council member for the past six years.

This will be the sixth time that the Xi has been privileged to be host to the Annual Convention of Psi Upsilon. The previous occasions were: 1848, 1865, 1877, 1897, and 1921. The coincidence of the 120th year of Psi Upsilon, the 110th Anniversary of the Xi, and the Fortieth Reunion of one of its most famous delegations, augurs a memorable Convention.

An outstanding feature of the Convention will be the honoring of Albert C. Jacobs, Phi '21, who will be installed in March as President of Trinity College, the home of the Beta Beta Chapter, at Hart-

ford, Connecticut, just 16 miles from Wesleyan. Brother Jacobs, at present Chancellor of the University of Denver, and formerly Provost of Columbia University, is the son of Albert Poole Jacobs, Phi '73, author of "The Psi Upsilon Epitome," published in 1884, parts of which many of us had to commit to memory before initiation. Brother Al himself was a member of the Executive Council, 1948-50, and was a major contributor to and co-editor of the "Annals of Psi Upsilon," published in 1941.

Presidents of other New England colleges who, it is hoped, may be at the forthcoming Convention are Roswell Gray Ham, Epsilon '14, President of Mount Holyoke College and formerly a member of the Executive Council, and A. Whitney Griswold, Beta '29, President of Yale University, alma mater of so many distinguished Psi U's. Prescott S. Bush, Beta '17, newly elected Senator from Connecticut, may also be present.

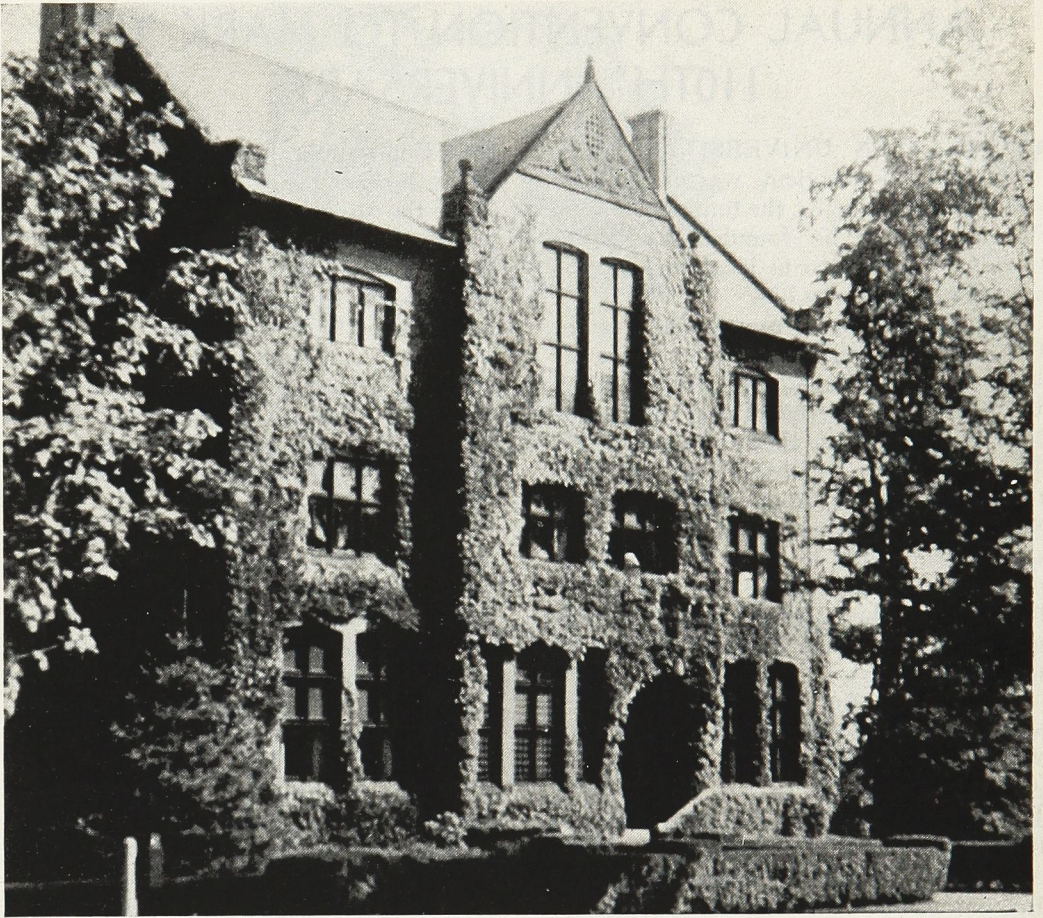
Chairman of the arrangements for the Convention is Robert I. Laggren, who is not only a member of the Executive Council, but a trustee of Wesleyan University. The vice-chairman is Charles B. '19, president, Warren L. Hall, '37, secretary, Henry C. Trundle, '21, treasurer, and Malcolm Stearns, Jr., Gamma '39, assistant treasurer and faculty adviser to the Chapter. The various committees have not yet been selected, but these will be announced in a later issue of *THE DIAMOND*.

Full details of the plans for the 120th Convention, together with the final program, will be found in a later issue of *THE DIAMOND*. The Xi of staid old New England proposes as warm a welcome to our thirty living Chapters as was given last year by the Epsilon at the Golden Gate.

# ALBERT CHARLES JACOBS, PHI '21, NEW PRESIDENT OF TRINITY COLLEGE

**A** LEADING EDITORIAL in *The Hartford Courant*, of Sunday, October 19, 1952, reads in part: "Trinity took a long time in finding its new president. And well it might. For as A. Northey Jones (Beta Beta '17) of New York, chairman of the selection committee, remarked during the search, the college will have to live for some time with its new president. Dr. Jacobs was known at Columbia for his outgoing friendliness, as well as for the professional competence to which his record bears witness. Trinity's future is now in the hands of an educator. The new president, the college, and the larger community alike can look forward to a happy association." Serving with Brother Jones on an eight-man committee on selection of a new president, which had investigated more than 200 recommendations, in a search extending over a year and a half, were Brothers Newton C. Brainard, Beta '02, chairman of the board of trustees, and Dr. Jerome P. Webster, Beta Beta '10, an outstanding plastic surgeon of New York.

Brother Jacobs succeeds G. Keith Funston, who assumed duties as president of the New York Stock Exchange in September, 1951, after six years as president of the 130-year old college of 900 men. It is expected that installation ceremonies of Brother Jacobs will take place this coming Spring.

In returning to New England, Brother Jacobs is on familiar ground, for his ancestors settled in Hingham, Mass., in 1636. His mother, Grace W. (Grinnell) Jacobs, daughter of an Episcopal minister in Jackson, Michigan, was a descendent of Jonathan Edwards. Brother Jacobs' father, Albert Poole Jacobs, Phi '73, was a leading Detroit lawyer, and senior warden of St. Paul's Cathedral in Detroit. Unique in fraternity histories is the fact that the father wrote the first fifty years of Psi Upsilon, in his *Epitome*, and the son completed the history to 1941, in the *Annals of Psi Upsilon*. Brother Jacobs has one sister, Dr. Charlotte B. Newman,

Professor of Bacteriology at Hunter College, New York City.

He was selected as a Rhodes Scholar upon his graduation from the University of Michigan in 1921. At Oxford, he was named a don, the only American ever to get a lecturing fellowship. He stayed in England for six years as a lecturer in jurisprudence at Oriel and Brasenose Colleges while earning the degrees of Bachelor of Arts in 1923, Bachelor of Civil Law in 1924, and the Oxford Master of Arts, considered equivalent of the American doctorate, in 1927.

He joined the Columbia University faculty in 1927 as a lecturer in law and was recognized as an outstanding teacher before he reached the age of 30, being promoted to assistant professor in 1928, and associate professor in 1929 at the age of 29. He became a full professor in 1936. His popularity with the faculty was attested by his election to the presidency of the Mens' Faculty Club of the University for six years from 1934 to 1940. From 1939 to 1942, he was chairman of the University Committee on Public Ceremonies and in 1942 was chairman of the Committee on University Security. Dr. Jacobs is a prominent Episcopal layman, having served while at Columbia as a member of the Board of Religious Education of the Diocese of New York and chairman of the Commission on College Work.

Trinity was founded as a college for men of all faiths by Episcopalians in 1823 and has always maintained a close, informal relationship with the Episcopal Church and a strong emphasis on spiritual development in its requirements. Dr. Jacobs is now a vestryman of St. John's Cathedral in Denver of which the Dean is the Very Rev. Paul Roberts, Beta Beta '09.

Dr. Jacobs' undergraduate study at Michigan had been interrupted by service as a private in World War I. During the second World War, he was commissioned a lieutenant commander in the Naval Reserve in 1942, and rose to captain during



his service as Director of the Casualties and Dependents Welfare Division of the Bureau of Naval Personnel in Washington until November, 1945. Brother Jacobs is an authority on family law. For his outstanding services during World War II, he was awarded the Legion of Merit by the Navy Department. He is author of *A Research of Family Law* (with Robert C. Angell), 1930, *Cases and Materials in Landlord and Tenant* (1931, 1941), *Cases and Materials on Domestic Relations* (1933, 1939, 1952, with Prof. Julius Goebel), which are considered bibles of the legal profession.

Upon his return to Columbia, he was made Assistant to the President for Veterans' Affairs, then Assistant to the President for General Academic Administration. When General Eisenhower was named President of Columbia in 1947, Dr. Jacobs was made Provost of the University. At that time, a university announcement said that he would be Eisenhower's "principal assistant" and act as his "alter ego and successor during the President's necessary absences from the University or in event of any emergency."

Upon announcement of Dr. Jacobs' appointment at Denver, General Eisenhower said that his "contributions to the University and to higher education in general have been brilliant . . ." and added that he had been "impressed with his extraordinary value to the University . . . his record as a great university administrator . . . long an outstanding teacher of law, an authority in his field." Of his war service, the General said that the "Navy placed on his shoulders great responsibility, which he discharged with distinction."

As Chancellor of the University of Denver since 1949, he has headed the largest university in the Rocky Mountain area, and is credited with restoring the University to a position of leadership among independent universities in the West after a difficult period of post-war adjustment. The term Chancellor is used in place of President at the University of Denver.

At Denver, Dr. Jacobs has led extensive reorganization of both the curriculum and faculty; reshaped the curriculum of the

Community College to meet the needs of Denver adults, reorganized the athletic department under E. E. (Tad) Wieman, and taken a leading part in Denver civic affairs. His commencement addresses won Freedoms Foundation Awards for the past two years, and the University of Denver won the Outstanding Campus Program Freedoms Foundation Award for 1951.

Brother Jacobs has honorary degrees from Columbia, Colorado College, Syracuse, Temple and the University of Colorado. Now, as he is about to leave the University of Denver, the board of trustees have conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Public Service. A citation read by Board President Robert W. Selig, on November 20, in part states, ". . . now in three years of devoted service in Denver affording the University, the city and the region an unparalleled stimulus to intellectual progress and creative citizenship and bringing the entire nation a greater understanding of the vital importance of independent higher education and the means for its preservation and progress; architect of freedom, soon returning to the East but implanting in the educational, religious, governmental, and business institutions of the West not only challenging goals and perspectives but also positive steps for their fulfillment; good citizen who shall always have the respect, admiration and affection of the people of the West; a scholar, a gentleman, a public servant of the highest sense."

Brother Jacobs was appointed Chairman of the 1952 Awards Jury of the Freedoms Foundation, at Valley Forge, which was founded for "Preserving and Extending the American Way of Life."

In 1927, Brother Jacobs married Loretta Field Beal, of Ann Arbor, a graduate of the University of Michigan, '24, and a daughter of Junius E. Beal, for 32 years a Regent of that University. The Ella Travis Beal Residence Hall for Nurses at the University is named in honor of Mrs. Jacobs' mother, for her many decades of loyal service to the University of Michigan. The Jacobs' have three children, Loretta, a graduate of the University of Michigan,

## PSI U PERSONALITY OF THE MONTH

### L. Clare Moyer, D.S.O., Q.C., Nu '10

**A**S SENIOR OFFICER of Parliament, Brother L. Clare Moyer holds Letters Patent dated December 20, 1938, signed by the late Governor General Tweedsmuir, and bearing the Great Seal of Canada constituting and appointing him "Clerk of the Senate, Clerk of the Parliaments and Master in Chancery of the Dominion of Canada."

Brother Moyer has brought to the duties of one of the most important posts in the Canadian parliamentary system a distinguished and versatile experience gained as a soldier, newspaperman, lawyer and

former secretary to the late Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King.

Brother Moyer comes of staunch Liberal stock. He was born at Preston, Ontario, and is a fifth generation Canadian. He is the son of the late Dr. Sylvester Moyer who was a candidate for the Federal House in 1908 and 1911. He secured his primary education at Galt, Ontario, and graduated in 1910 from the Arts Faculty of the University of Toronto with Honours in Political Economy.

In his senior year at the University he edited the student publication *Varsity*. On



### About the Author

Lorne Miller Firth, Nu '16, is a member of the legal division of the Department of Veterans' Affairs in Canada, his special appointment being "Estates Officer." For seven and a half years, from December 1939 to August 1947, he was Director of Estates, the Branch of the Department of National Defense which he organized and headed. This had as its purpose the administration of the service estates of all the Canadian forces, Navy, Army and Air, who died on active service or subsequent to their discharge on the treatment strength of the Department of Veterans' Affairs. At the present time, the National Defence Department still administers the active service death estates, while Brother Firth, who holds the rank of colonel, administers the estates of those dying on Department of Veterans' Affairs strength in its hospitals across Canada after their discharge from the forces. He has been awarded the O.B.E. (Military Division), and is a Queen's Counsel Q.C.

Brother Firth is married, has a son, a daughter and a granddaughter.

graduation he went to the reportorial staff of the *Toronto Daily Star*. A year later he moved westward to Regina, Saskatchewan, where he covered the Provincial Legislature for the *Regina Leader*. At that time there were no Hansard reports of legislature proceedings. Consequently the young man in the Press Gallery had to labor long and assiduously. While he was still serving the *Regina Leader*, Brother Moyer commenced the study of law, and was admitted to the Saskatchewan Bar in 1915.

Shortly thereafter he proceeded overseas with a Regina Infantry regiment, and saw service at the front from 1916 to 1919 in France, Belgium and Germany. He was twice mentioned in despatches and was awarded the D.S.O. While in Germany

he served as Intelligence Officer with one of the occupying Canadian units.

After the War Brother Moyer engaged in the practice of law at Regina until 1921 when he became a Law Officer in the Attorney General's Department. A year later he came to Ottawa as Secretary to Prime Minister Mackenzie King. He remained at this post for five years.

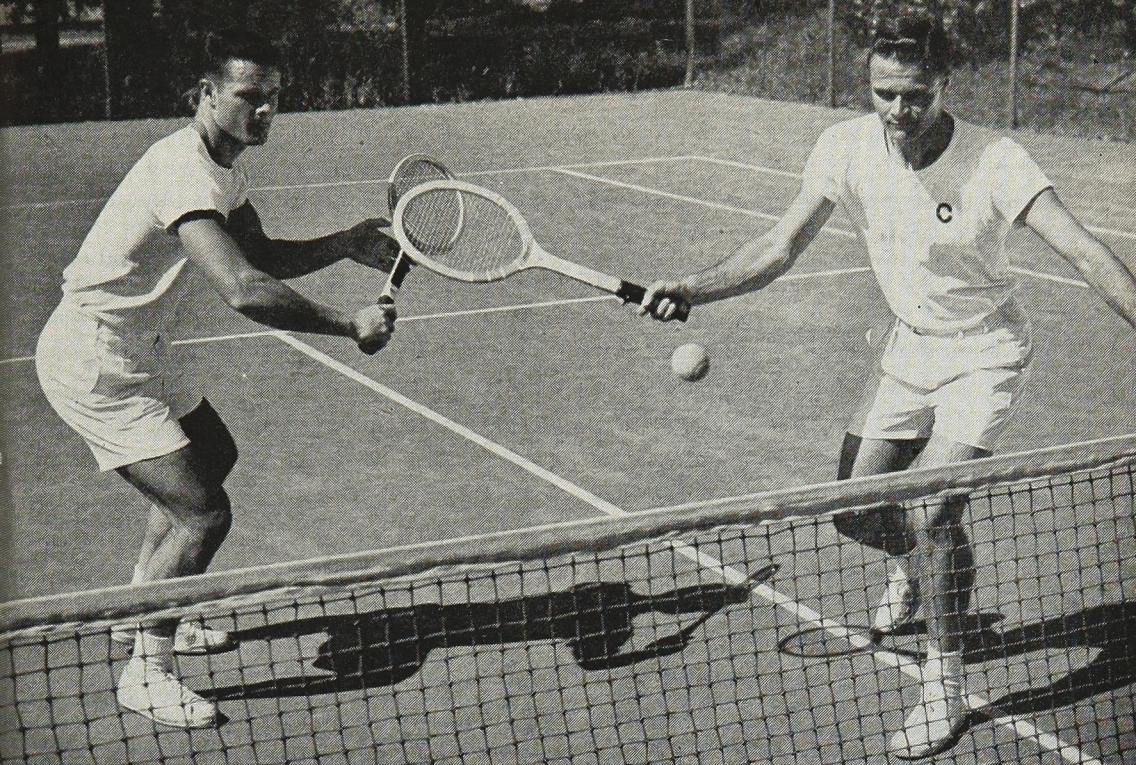
He spent the next ten years in the private practice of law in the Canadian Capital.

In 1938 the Governor General in Council (which is to say Mr. Mackenzie King) appointed Brother Moyer to his present position. An interesting side light on this appointment is the fact that his wife is the granddaughter of the late Major S. E. St. Onge Chapleau, who was Clerk of the Senate from 1900 to 1917, and who, as a young French-Canadian, served with gallantry throughout the U. S. Civil War, first as an enlisted man and ultimately as a Major in the Federal army. Major Chapleau is buried with his American wife in Arlington Cemetery.

During World War II Brother Moyer, in addition to his Senatorial duties, served as Press Censor for Canada, and later as Secretary of the Wartime Information Board.

While Brother Moyer's background is definitely Liberal, he has always enjoyed a wide popularity on Parliament Hill in all political circles. His is an impressive as well as a uniformly courteous and genial personality, and ever since he came to Ottawa his close friendships have been quite regardless of political lines. His reputation as a public official while secretary to Prime Minister King was that of a most efficient administrator who had a capacity for an infinite amount of work with the minimum of nervous strain upon the staff associated with it. His appointment to his present position was no less acceptable to the Conservative members of the Upper House than it was satisfactory to the Liberals.

## THE RICKSENS

### A Psi U and Epsilon Family

Dear Pete:

I regret the delay in answering your

letter of September 1, but it arrived just after I returned from vacation and I was immediately confronted with the trial of some lawsuits. In addition, I was unable to get a tennis photo until now.

You asked for information concerning my wife and the boys. Mrs. Ricksen and I were married May 12, 1930; her name prior to her marriage was Bertha Clymer. We were classmates at the University of California. She was Vice President of our senior class and a member of Sigma Kappa sorority. She was an active person at the University of California, and was a member of all of the important women's honorary organizations, Torch and Shield and Mortar Board being amongst them. As I have indicated, we were both members of the undergraduate class of 1930. I played baseball during my time at the



University, and had the pleasure of being head of the Psi U. House in my senior year.

As for the twins, they were born November 20, 1931, John being the senior of the two by two hours. They attended Berkeley High school where they played basketball and tennis. In their senior year in high school John was President of the class and Rupert was Vice President. Basketball, I believe, was their outstanding sport. They were both selected as All Northern California in their senior year in high school. John, in his senior year, broke the existing records for the Alameda County Athletic League both in scoring for the entire season, and for the most points scored in any one game when he scored 37 points against Albany High school. They have been regulars on the University of California basketball team since they entered the University, and next year, their senior year, they are the co-captains of the 1952-53 basketball team, a team, by the way, which the people out here feel should be an outstanding one.

As far as their tennis is concerned, they haven't devoted much time to tournament tennis, although as juniors Rupert won the State of Washington singles junior championship, and John won the same event in the Western Canadian Championships. They both won the doubles events in these tournaments and in addition were the doubles winners in the Pacific Northwest Tournament. Since entering college, their

tennis has been restricted to intercollegiate competition. They were the No. One Doubles Team at the University of California in their Sophomore and Junior years. In their Sophomore year they went to the semi-finals of the doubles in the National Intercollegiates; Rupert got to the quarter-finals in the singles. In their Junior year they got to the quarter-finals in the National Intercollegiates in the doubles.

You asked for clippings. I regret that I have none that I can send. Mrs. Rickson and I took upon ourselves the task of keeping a newspaper size scrap book, and we have filled some 60 pages with clippings, but unfortunately they are too well pasted in to get out and forward to you.

We both enjoyed your letter and the many complimentary things you had to say in it. We feel that the nice things you stated about us were probably exaggerated, but this generosity on your part is characteristic of your good nature, but nevertheless enjoyable to us.

It was our pleasure to have you and the other Council members and their wives as our guests and we sincerely hope that we may enjoy this privilege again.

I received your 1948 Olympics Report and am proud to be the possessor of it. Thank you for being kind enough to include me.

I am forwarding to you a picture as you requested, and hope that it proves satisfactory.

The Michigan Historical Collections of the University of Michigan has for several years possessed a great many records of national fraternities. Among these records those of Psi Upsilon are particularly complete. They include *The Annals*, 1833-1941, complete file of THE DIAMOND, *Occasions in Psi Upsilon*, *The Epitome*, *Homes of Psi Upsilon*, *The Song Book*, and *Phi of Psi Upsilon*.

Recently Brother Babst, by a gift of

\$500, acquired from the Archives of Psi Upsilon for the Collections more than one hundred volumes of surplus catalogs and other publications of the older national fraternities, some of them issued more than a century ago. These volumes, together with other fraternity materials which the Collections had on its shelves at Ann Arbor, comprise an unusually large body of fraternity materials, possibly the largest available to the public.



# NEW CHAIRMAN OF NEW YORK CLEARING HOUSE ASSOCIATION

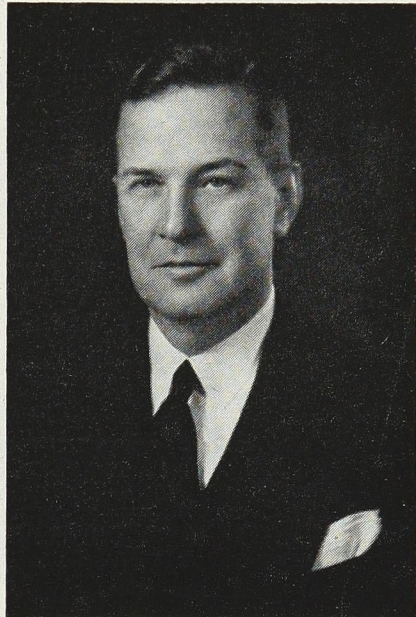
William L. Kleitz, Chi '15

**A** BROTHER Psi U is president of one of the great banks of the country and, for that matter, of the world. He is William L. Kleitz, Chi '15, who for 33 years has been with Guaranty Trust Company of New York, the last six years as its president. Guaranty's resources exceed \$3,000,000,000, and its capital, surplus, and undivided profits of \$380,000,000 constitute one of the largest capital structures of any bank in the world.

Brother Kleitz was born May 2, 1894, in Highland Falls, New York, but grew up in Elmira, attending the public schools preparatory to entering Cornell University, where he was initiated into Psi U's Chi Chapter. In college he leaned toward journalism, serving as editor-in-chief of the *Cornell Daily Sun* and during two summer vacations as a reporter for the *New York Tribune*. Upon graduation he began his financial career through happenstance—his roommate's brother-in-law, Jansen Noyes, Chi '10, appeared on the scene the day before the concluding exercises, offered him a job in a Wall Street bond house, and he took it.

Two years of World War I service intervened before Brother Kleitz switched to the commercial banking field. During that period he received officers' training at Madison Barracks, New York, and was regimental adjutant for ten months. He was discharged with the rank of Captain of Infantry.

Upon joining Guaranty in a clerical capacity with the bond department in 1919, his ability and friendliness were manifest and won him rapid recognition. The following year he was appointed assistant treasurer and successive promotions elevated him to assistant vice-president in 1923 and vice-president in 1928. He became associated with the general management of the bank in 1945, was elected a member of the board of directors the

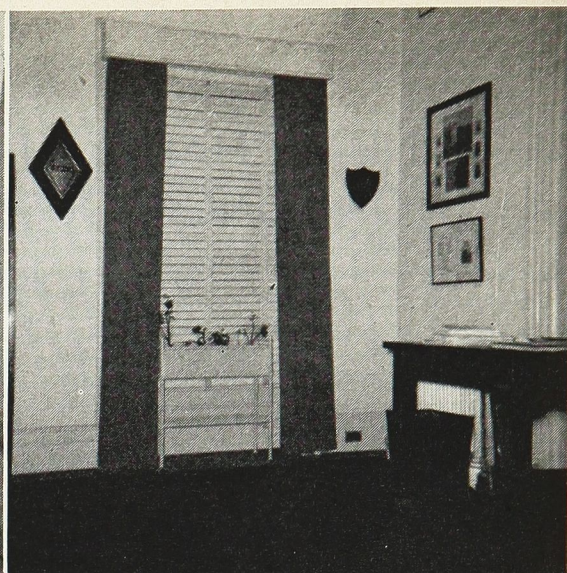
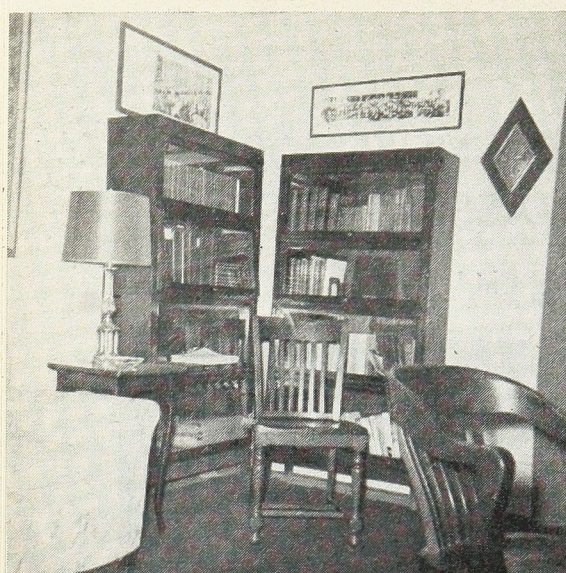
following year, and president in January, 1947.

In 1917 Brother Kleitz married Harriet Selby Gillette, of Sheridan, Wyoming. Their daughter, Virginia, is the wife of Spencer D. Moseley, a former football captain at Yale who is now a Marine jet pilot. The Moseleys have two sons.

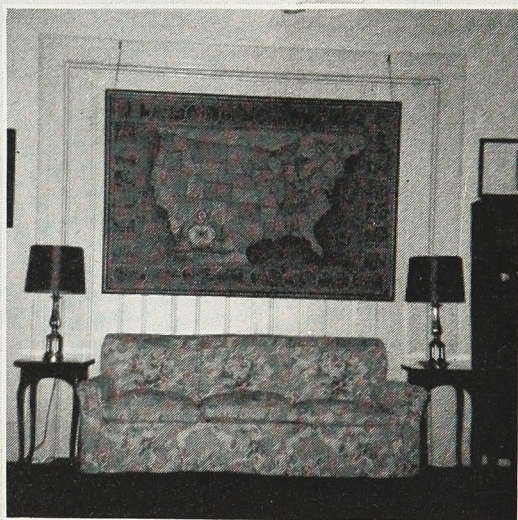

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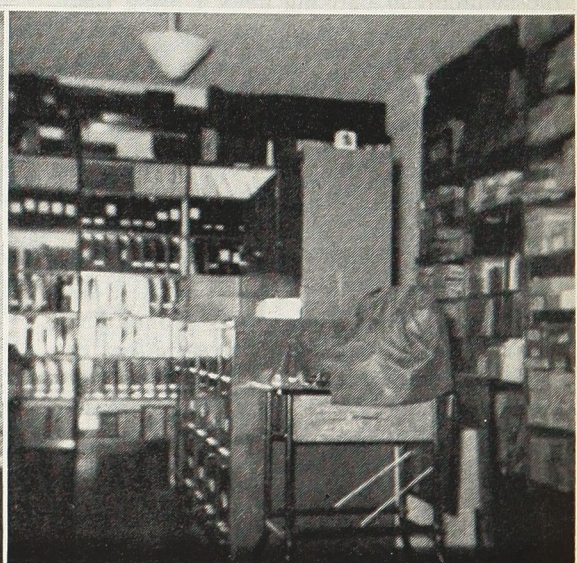
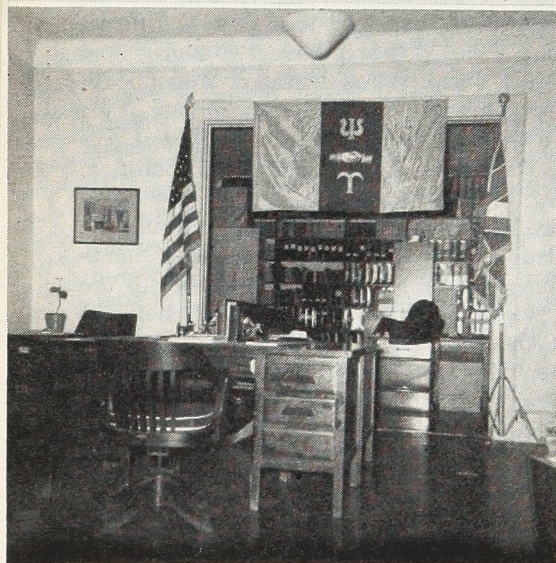




Some glimpses of

## ALUMNI NOTES

GEORGE M. HUMPHREY, Phi '12, has been appointed Secretary of the Treasury of the United States by President-elect Eisenhower. Brother Humphrey will be written up as "Psi U Personality of the Month" in the March issue of THE DIAMOND, at which time he will be Secretary of the Treasury. The following is reprinted, by permission, from "The Michigan Alumnus" of December 13, 1952:

George M. Humphrey, Phi '12, played football while a student at Saginaw High School, but he left the gridiron sport alone when he got to the Ann Arbor campus. He had been a strong student in high school and this classroom ability was duplicated in the Law School, where he won a place on *The Michigan Law Review* staff, an honor which went only to top ranking students. He also won election to the Order of Coif, the highest scholastic honor society of the school. He attended the School of Engineering in 1908-09.

He also was a member of Toastmasters, currently the oldest extra-curricular honorary society for Michigan students, and of Wool-sack and Barristers. His social fraternity was Psi Upsilon and his professional fraternity Phi Delta Phi. His class historian lists him as a participant in Michigan Union Operas. His Senior Class President is now a Regent of the University, Roscoe O. Bonisteel.

CHARLES C. BOVEY, Beta '90, resigned last June as a director of General Mills. He had sat on the board of General Mills and its predecessor, Washburn-Crosby Company, for 50 years and had served both firms for a total of 61 years. He was 87 years old.

His interest in the milling business began at Yale University, where he and John Crosby, also Beta '90, were roommates. Brother Crosby retired in June, 1951, as a director. He, too, had served the two companies for 61 years.

Brother Bovey was the founder of the products control system which made possible mass production of uniform flour. He joined Washburn-Crosby in 1891, in the freight department, but his interest in producing uniform products led him to set up the first testing laboratory. Before that millers had used the "rule of thumb" method in flour production.

Brother Bovey traveled widely in Europe

to pick up new ideas in flour milling and also set up the first export department for Washburn-Crosby.

Born in Canada at St. Johns, New Brunswick, October 25, 1864, Brother Bovey went to Minneapolis when it was a city of 15,000. He attended Jefferson grade and Central high schools before going to Phillips Academy at Andover, Mass.

He was known as an ardent hunter, fisherman and sailor. He was keenly interested in schools and was the first president of the board of trustees of Blake school and a member of the board for 30 years. He also was a trustee of Dunwoody institute for years.

Brother Bovey was married in 1898 to Kate Koon. They had three children, Martin K. Bovey, Concord, Mass.; Mrs. Ruth Bovey Stevens, Wayzata, and Charles A. Bovey, Great Falls, Mont., who has made a hobby of restoring the historic Montana mining town of Virginia City.

In the November issue of the *Brooklyn Central*, Y.M.C.A. magazine, is published a significant and touching editorial entitled "As I See It" by the Hon. EDWIN L. GARVIN, Delta '97. Brother Garvin, who is Official Referee of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, has written with great sincerity and charm about his lifelong friend, the Rev. Dr. John T. Wilds, late pastor of the Seventh Presbyterian Church, Broome Street, New York City.

DONALD B. DERBY, Pi '18, a past president of the Pi Chapter Trust Association, and a member of the Executive Council of Psi Upsilon, has become president of the United States Finishing Company, at Norwich, Connecticut, where he now makes his residence.

PHILIP R. CHASE, Gamma '27, general agent of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co., in Syracuse, N.Y., is now president of the New York State Association of Life Underwriters. Brother Chase heads this organization of over 5,000 members after having served a term as vice-president.

CHARLES R. WARDELL, Pi '40, is now vice-president of the Whiteford Paper Co., Inc.,



with offices at 120 LaSalle St., Chicago 3, Ill. Brother Wardell's firm specializes in designed packaging papers. He resides in Evanston, Ill.

JAMES A. CADWALLADER, Pi '36, is the newly appointed accountant for the light military equipment unit of the General Electric Company's commercial and government equipment department.

A graduate of Syracuse University, Brother Cadwallader joined the General Electric Co. at Bridgeport, Conn., in 1936. In 1946, he was transferred to Syracuse and until recently was supervisor of cost for the commercial and government equipment department.

He will have financial responsibility at the company's new plant at New Hartford, near Utica, which will be completed this year, and at the present plant at State Street, Utica, N.Y.

ERIC W. WILL, Pi '18, president of Hotel Syracuse, Inc., and vice-president of Will & Baumer Candle Company, Syracuse, N.Y., has been elected president of Onondaga Council, Boy Scouts of America. Brother Will, long active in local charitable and fraternal circles, has served as chairman of the finance committee and vice-president for several years.

EDGAR B. INGRAHAM, Pi '12, was one of three to receive the top alumni award, the George Arents Medal, at Syracuse University this past June for excellence in their chosen fields.

Honored by his co-workers in the field, Brother Ingraham was made president of the National Association of Electric Distributors in 1947, and was awarded the James H. McGraw Award to electrical wholesalers in 1948.

He began his business career in 1912 as an employee of the Edison Lamp Works of the General Electric Company, shortly after graduation from Syracuse University with an electrical engineering degree.

Brother Ingraham is the father of Frank Whitman Ingraham, Pi '36.

HENRY B. POOR, Gamma '39, is Headmaster of the Fountain Valley School located in Colorado Springs, Colo.

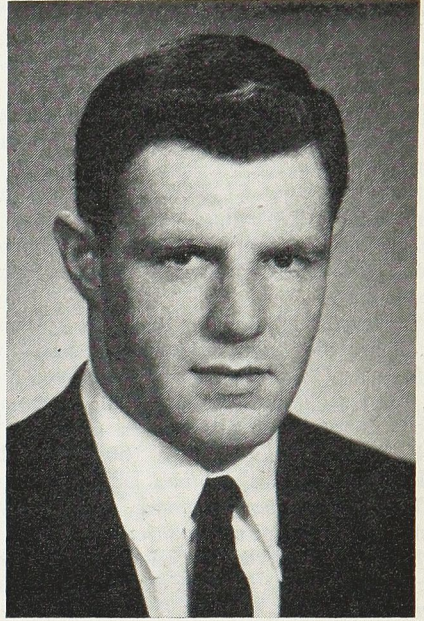

### University of Michigan

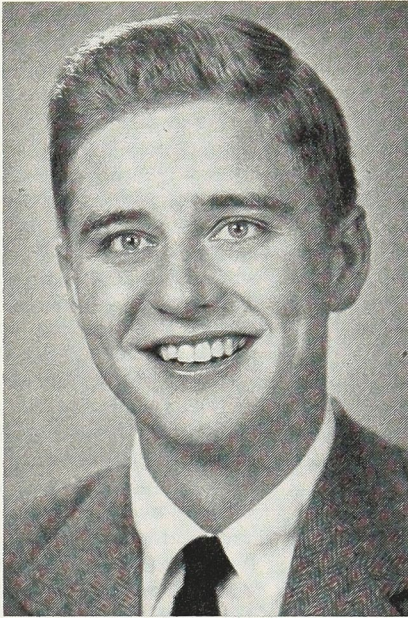

## OMEGA University of Chicago

The coming year will be an interesting and important one for the Omega Chapter. The strength and influence of fraternities at the University of Chicago has been declining steadily for many years, as more and more chapters become inactive and as students who are interested in serious participation in fraternity responsibilities are admitted in decreasing numbers. The past two years have seen the loss of three fraternity chapters from this campus, as well as increasing control by

Student Government of fraternity bidding and social activities. Most recent of these moves has been a desire expressed by representatives of Student Government to check the constitutions of all fraternities on campus to determine whether or not they involve discriminatory clauses. As yet no inspections have been made, and it is expected that Student Government and University officials will accept the word of responsible house officers on these matters.

These difficulties have been offset somewhat by the University's permitting younger men to be bid, which has provided additional sources of rushees, but has brought with it problems of adjustment within the individual chapters to the different outlooks and activities of the new men.

But Psi U continues to meet these various problems, which are not new this quarter, by serious planning and concerted effort. Due to its over-all attractiveness, the Omega has been able to maintain a congenial and well-knit group of members. The situation is a cumulative one; good men in the house attract more good men, and the inverse is true as well. Psi U's present position of excellence has been maintained, not by luck, but by the hard work of some of the Brothers in rushing, and the equally important, though not as frequently glorified, efforts of the other Brothers in keeping the House attractive to rushees, in appearance and atmosphere.

The Chapter was officially inactive during the summer, but a number of Brothers remained in the House and carried on an informal program of athletic and social activities. Some roomers were selected for the summer quarter, and this both assisted the House financially and also made the Chapter better known to the students. One man has already been initiated into the Omega who began his association with us as a roomer last summer.

The Omega is now quite strong in membership, with 31 actives and six pledges. Formal rushing of college students, which involves smokers on designated evenings, will begin February 15 of next year. But, in the meantime, informal rushing is going on, with new men frequently being brought over to meet the active Chapter. We realize the importance of rushing, both in the immediate and distant future, and we are making serious efforts to continue to enjoy our traditional high standards.

Our social program to date has been extensive, but the nearness of examinations has slowed down some of that activity recently. The annual Hard Times open house and dance was the usual gay success, with all guests having an informal, nay, one might almost



say wild, evening at the house amid the unusual decorations and plentiful liquid refreshments. The Interfraternity Ball, a far more sedate affair, followed on Thanksgiving Eve. This traditional formal dance, preceded by a dinner and cocktail party at the Chapter House, was a fine success and enjoyed by all. There have been numerous smaller parties at the House during the year, some on weekends and some, in the form of mixer coffee-hours with girls' Clubs, after Monday evening meetings.

The large number of Brothers participating in University varsity athletics decreases the number of men available for fraternity teams, but we have none the less maintained our usual high position in athletics. Psi U has taken first place in both the all-fraternity and all-campus football leagues, defeating its many opponents by an aggregate of 253 to 19 score points. ## BETA BETA Trinity College

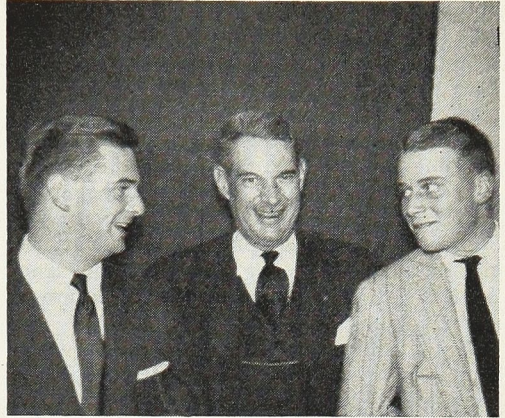
On Wednesday evening, November 5, the Beta Beta Chapter elected new officers for the coming four months.

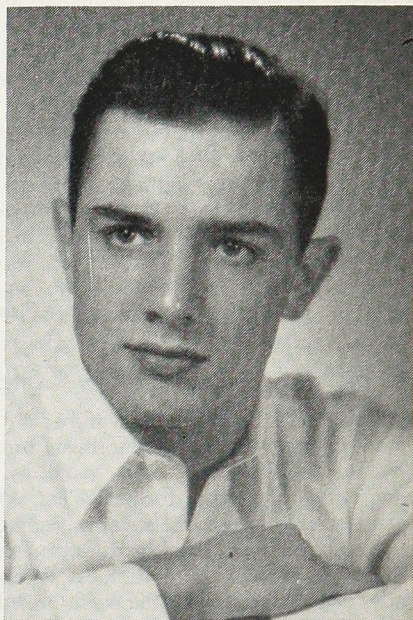

We are proud of the present condition of the Chapter House, which, since the Convention in June, has been undergoing still further improvement. The House was unmarked from the sharp earthquake which occurred early in the term.

Another job, that of Assistant House Manager was created this fall for the purpose of training the successive House Managers, thereby effecting a much smoother transition from one to another. It was decided that the House Manager shall henceforth hold office for an entire academic year, and during that period have the help of several assistants who shall compete for election as the next year's manager.

A very successful fall social season was concluded by a Christmas Party for underprivileged children held December 17. Our Mothers' Club put on two Open Houses before the UCLA and Stanford games which were wonderful events. They donate much time and effort to the House, and we are extremely grateful for their support. The Founders' Day Banquet was held on November 14 in San Francisco. In spite of a great deal of preliminary planning only twenty of our alumni attended. We hope to bring a larger turnout next year.

It is unfortunate that at this time when the Epsilon feels a greater security than it has enjoyed for perhaps twenty years, the threat of the draft assumes prominent proportions to many of our members, although a majority are engaged in some form of training program. Already Brother Fred Emanuels and Pledge Joe Smidt are in naval training in San Diego as a result of being drafted, and Brother Nick Mulvaney expects to enter the armed forces in January.

The problem in attaining and maintaining a well-rounded House is a large one which confronts any fraternity, especially one in a big university. The outlook for the Epsilon is good; we have a well rounded House and are primarily interested in its staying that way.

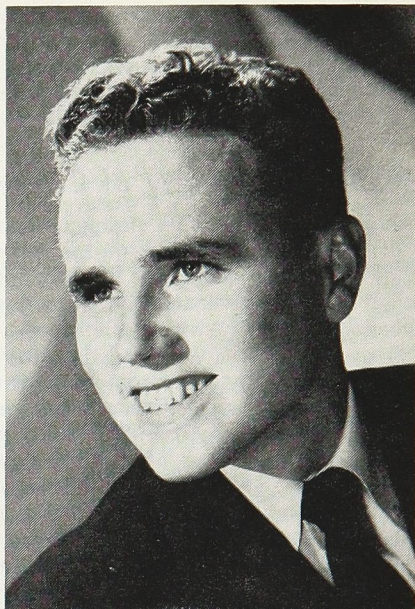

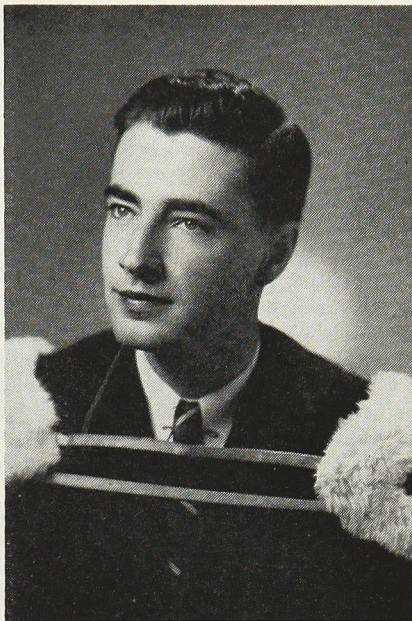
