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GENERAL INFORMATION



WELCOME TO THE 179th PSI UPSILON CONVENTION!

This introduction is intended mainly for those of you who are attending a Psi Upsilon Convention for the first time. The approaching days can seem hectic and confusing if you are not adequately prepared. These few pages will give you an idea of what you should expect and what is expected of you. For those of you who have been to previous Conventions, it may be helpful to review this section as a refresher.

The Convention is the legislative body of the Fraternity. It sets the course for Psi Upsilon for the coming year. Every chapter has up to three delegates who can vote at the Convention sessions: two from every undergraduate chapter and one from every alumni association. Each full attendee (whether an accredited delegate or not) is assigned to one of five standing committees: *Awards*, *Budget and Development, New Business, Nominations and Credentials* or *Unfinished Business*. If your name is not listed with any committee, please check with the Registration Desk for your assignment.

Each committee has an assigned list of topics to address, but a new topic may be introduced by anyone. The chairmen and vice-chairmen of the committees will lead the discussion, in which everyone is expected to participate. The committee will reach a decision and will prepare either a *recommendation* (which does not require a vote) or a *resolution* (which requires a vote) to present to the Convention as a whole. Resolutions which are *legislative* in nature are termed *general resolutions* and others are termed *special resolutions*.

These resolutions or recommendations are presented by the chairmen, vice-chairmen or individual committee members at General Sessions of the Convention. If you wish to speak for or against a motion, you must be recognized by the chair; then give your *name*, *chapter and class*, *and state your point*. General Sessions will be chaired by Jeremy McKeon, Eta '08, president of the Executive Council and president of the 179th Convention. Parliamentary procedure will be followed. A roll call of accredited delegates will be taken at the start of each general session and *only* accredited delegates may vote at these sessions. All other full registrants, however, are encouraged to attend and participate in discussion. Any new topics or general resolutions introduced at a General Session will be referred to a committee.

The materials you now hold contain all the information you will need to actively participate in the 179th Convention. An examination of its contents will give you an idea of where the Fraternity is today and what action this Convention needs to take. You should review all the materials as you will be expected to vote on resolutions coming out of the committees based on this information.

It is suggested that you read over the schedule with some care; it will give you an idea of what to expect. Since every effort will be made to adhere strictly to this schedule, arrive *on time* for everything. Business attire will be required for all Convention sessions on Friday and Sunday. The roster of participants is included in this section, and we encourage you to meet and network with the delegates from the other chapters. Your committee assignment can also be found in this section. *Any last-minute schedule changes will be announced.*

The material is divided into nine sections:

- I. *General Information* In addition to this introduction, there is information on how to write a resolution, directory of staff, roster of participants, listing of chapters and other information.
- II. Standing Committees The topics that each committee will discuss are found at the beginning of this section, and the information the committees need for their deliberations is found there as well.
- III. **Budget and Development** This section includes unaudited financial statements for 2022-23, a budget for the 2023-24 year, an assessment schedule of expected taxes and fees for the year and an A/R record for chapters.
- IV. *Constitution and Policies* A copy of the Psi Upsilon Constitution as of the previous convention as well as the policies of the fraternity.
- V. 178th Convention Records This contains all of the information, resolutions, and recommendations from the 2022 Convention in Washington, D.C. Also included in this section are the Convention Rules, which will be reviewed at the Opening Session of the Convention on Friday.
- VI. **Executive Council Information** The agenda for the summer meeting of the Executive Council, which takes place on Friday, heads this section. It is followed by minutes from all the previous Executive Council meetings for the past year. Included, here as well, is the Annual Communication of the Executive Council to the Convention.
- VII. *Chapter Reports* These are year-end reports prepared by each chapter, as required by our Constitution.
- VIII. *Foundation* Every accredited Convention delegate also serves as a member of The Psi Upsilon Foundation. This section will provide the necessary information for the Annual Members Meeting of The Psi Upsilon Foundation.
 - IX. **Songs of Psi Upsilon Fraternity** Throughout the Convention we will be singing the songs of Psi U.

Despite all this information, you still may be left with questions. Where should you go with them? The Registration Desk will be open and staffed throughout the Convention. It will serve as the center of activity. You are urged to stop by any time.

REMEMBER, you represent your chapter. You have an obligation and responsibility to attend **EVERY** session of this Convention. You have an opportunity to help guide the Fraternity through the next year. Take advantage of that opportunity. The more you give to this Convention, the more you will gain from it. **Share. Learn. Enjoy.**



Applied Situational Leadership: How to Optimize Yourself and Lead Effectively (9 – 11:45)



Dr. Michael Dunphy, Ph.D.

The core trait of all great leaders is that they are initiators. Leaders are able to rally talented people and help them to apply themselves individually and collectively to a cause. The cause may be to create an amazing Fraternal Brotherhood, to run a great new business, to complete a major project or to restructure an existing process like a curriculum or marketing campaign. Leaders must be initiators, risk takers who point our options and start action, but they must also be able to keep talented people engaged and develop them as they move forward. In this session, you will learn how to do both. You will be introduced to the "champion mindset" of initiators and the tactical methods of Situational Leadership to help you develop yourself and anyone else in any "situation". When you finish this session, you will understand how to apply both strategies right away and you will be given tools to help you increase your ability to use these methods for a lifetime. This session will be highly interactive, loaded with practical tips and directly applicable to your life immediately.

Dr. Michael Dunphy is a professional speaker, educator and leadership coach. Since 2000, Dr. Dunphy has completed over 600 training programs for professionals in businesses organizations and universities across America. Having earned three college degrees, including a Ph.D. in Biochemistry, Dr. Dunphy has been involved in leadership roles throughout his university career and is currently serving as Dean of the

School of Arts and Sciences at Walsh University. Dr. Dunphy is also the CEO of two successful business and has coached men and women in leadership skills in companies as diverse as Pfizer, Disney, Kenan Advantage Group, NovoNordisk, WIC, Allergan and many others. Dr. Dunphy is also the professional speaking coach for an NFL player and an NBA player. Highly trained in Situational Leadership, Emotional Intelligence, Conflict Prevention and Resolution and Building High Performance Teams, Dr. Dunphy is one of the most "in demand" professionals in leadership training and executive coaching. He is also highly skilled in martial tactical training, having 40 years of experience in close-quarter combat skills and practical application of martial principles to leadership. In addition, Dr. Dunphy has published two books, numerous articles on leadership and many peer-reviewed publications in biochemistry. As a professional educator, Dr. Dunphy is well versed in the current best-practices in neurological learning and his programs are all highly interactive, practical and filled with immediately useful knowledge and skills.

Round 1 (3:00 - 3:45):

Situational Leadership

Georgia 2

A follow up to the leadership academy Dr. Dunphy will be making time to answer questions and discuss some of the ways you may be able to use the components of what he spoke about in your chapter.

Being Inclusive: Connecting with ALL of campus *Georgia 3*

Does your chapter have any best practices to work with all walks of students on campus? Does your chapter need help to become more inclusive on campus, learning how to connect with someone not like themselves? Do all your members feel welcome in your chapter's activities? Through open and honest discussions, we can shed some light on issues facing all campus groups, and work to make your chapter open and accepting of all members of the campus community.

Recruitment Trends and Best Practices

Georgia 4

This roundtable will focus on strategies that are currently working for chapters of Psi Upsilon across the country, as well as be an opportunity to hear about National trends and best practices in supporting strong, repeatable recruitment results. Attendees are asked to bring strategies and activities that are working well for them to share, as well as any trends they are seeing on their own campuses relating to membership recruitment.

Utilizing the Connects Grant: A Way to Help Fund Your Educational Programs Georgia 5

In 2020 the Psi Upsilon Foundation created a way for chapters to apply for educational grants for educational programs that they run on their campus: from bringing in speakers, assisting with a career program, or traveling for educational purposes the Connects Grant may be a way to help your chapter. This session will share ways the grant can be used, how to apply, and how some chapters have utilized the grant.

How to create a Fundraising Program for an Alumni Association (Alumni Only) Georgia 6

Annual Funds, Special Projects, Capital Campaigns... all are connected but each is uniquely different. We'll discuss where to start or improve your programs, how to create a communications program to complement your fundraising, and some fun ways to boost your giving. In additional we'll discuss using a 3rd party to assist with this important work and how they can make your job easier. We will be joined by Brian Bates, A Principal and Founder of Elevate, IMS and alumni communication and engagement company.

Round 2 (4:00-4:45):

The Chapter Classification Matrix

Georgia 2

Over the last three years we've been working to find ways to better analyze chapter performance and find better ways to meet our chapter's needs. Our Classification Matrix is a piece of this puzzle and is being used to help see trends and assess what may be a root cause issue the chapter is facing. In this roundtable staff will discuss the Classification model and how we're utilizing it on our chapter services team.

Psi U Cares: Supporting One Another's Mental Well Being

Georgia 3

In 2016, After the 173rd Convention in 2016 Psi Upsilon started to focus more on mental health issues in our chapter's members and, over the years, that has grown into what is being called the Psi U Cares program. We'll review what is being asked of chapters, best practices chapters have to support one another, and ways to get involved on your campus and in your community to help de-stigmatize mental health issues.

Addressing Your Recruitment Challenges

Georgia 4

This session is your opportunity to bring any and all challenges that are holding your chapter back from being more successful to the table. You will receive support from both staff, alumni, and your peers to decrease and possibly even eliminate those barriers. Attendees are asked to bring challenges their chapters are facing to the table, (and what they have already done to address them) and be willing to provide feedback to others seeking assistance. Solutions will be centered around items within the scope of the chapter's control.

Telling Our Story: How to Get Involved and Support the History and Archives Program Georgia 5

There are many ways to get involved with the History and Archives Committee – whether it is being present at one of our weekends, writing articles for the website or the *Reflections* magazine, researching Psi U History, cataloging local materials and more. We also would love to hear from you and what you would like to see of this committee.

Alumni Advisory Board Meeting (Alumni Only)

Georgia 6

This is a time for alumni to give feedback on what needs they have and what they would like to see from the International Office as well as to discuss current programs in more detail. We ask that anyone who is an officer of their alumni association to attend.

Risk Management and Policy Review (Sunday, 2 – 2:30)


2023 Awards Banquet Keynote, Sunday:





Chapter Classification Report

As of the end of the 2022-2023 Academic Year, Psi Upsilon Chapters have fallen into the following classifications based on their reported achievements. 15 Chapters are in the Mission Sustaining Category, Chapters in "Mission Sustainment" are those whose operational procedures have led to a continued level of proficiency in reporting, financial obligations, observance of fraternity policy, service, philanthropy, and sustainment of chapter size. Chapters in this classification should generally focus on maintaining those operational procedures they have established and look to enhance the individual member's experience through programing and education.


5 are in the Operational Re-Alignment Classification, Chapters in "Operational Realignment" are those whose operational procedures have seen some neglect that has not yet impacted chapter size significantly. Chapters in this classification should generally focus on establishing good management habits especially as pertains to risk management, community engagement, and reporting.

5 are in the Growth Focused Category, Chapters in "Growth Focus" are those whose operational procedures have led to a level of proficiency in reporting, academic success, observance of fraternity policy, and commitment to service & philanthropy. Chapters in this classification should generally focus on maintaining those operational procedures they have established and actively work on growing the organization in a sustainable way.

1 is in the Operational Establishment Category, Chapters in "Operational Establishment" are those whose focus to improve should be placed on an overall focus of establishing routines of efficient and timely reporting and policy training among leadership, development of the individual member experience especially in academics and service, and engagement with the International Fraternity in leadership development opportunities.

Those chapters in the Mission Sustaining Category are, in alphabetical order:

BE IT RESOLVED: that Article IX, Section 8 of the Psi Upsilon Constitution, which presently reads, in part:

This Constitution recognizes no withdrawal from membership in the Fraternity.

be reworded to read:

This Constitution discourages withdrawal from membership in the Fraternity.

and be it further

RESOLVED: that a new Section 9, entitled "Withdrawal," be added to the Psi Upsilon Constitution after Section 8, that subsequent sections be renumbered accordingly, and that references to any renumbered sections be updated accordingly. The new section will read:

A member who wishes to withdraw from membership in the Fraternity may submit a written request to the International Office. Upon receipt and acceptance of such a request by the International Office, that individual shall no longer be a member of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity. They will enjoy none of the rights and privileges provided by this Constitution, and they may no longer present themselves as a member of the Fraternity. Under no circumstances shall an individual who has withdrawn from membership be re-elected to membership.

Generalizing Membership-at-Large

BE IT RESOLVED: that Article III, Section 1 of the Psi Upsilon Constitution, which presently reads, in part:

There shall be no more than two alumni term members from the same chapter serving at the same time.

be reworded to read:

There shall be no more than two alumni term members from the same chapter, and no more than two alumni term members who are members-at-large, serving at the same time.

and be it further

RESOLVED: that a new section, entitled "Membership-at-Large," be added to Article IX of the Psi Upsilon Constitution before the section on Honorary Membership, that subsequent sections be renumbered accordingly, and that references to any renumbered sections be updated accordingly. The new section will read:

In recognition of outstanding contributions to the Fraternity and exemplification of its ideals, the Executive Council or the Convention may select persons to be initiated as members of the Fraternity. Such members-at-large shall have all the rights and privileges of any member associated with a chapter, except that no at-large member shall be a chapter's delegate to the Convention as described in Article II, Section 3 of this Constitution.

Clearing Up Honorary Membership

BE IT RESOLVED: That Article IX, Section 12 (NB: this numbering assumes the prior motion passes—if it doesn't, this should read "Section 11") of the Psi Upsilon Constitution, which presently reads, in part:

Such honorary members shall not be entitled to any of the rights and privileges provided under Article II, Section 2, and Article III, Section 1, of this Constitution, provided, however, that honorary members shall have the right to attend the chapter meetings.

Committee on New Business

Establishment of an Alumni Association Fee

Whereas Alumni Associations receive benefits of work from the International Fraternity at no charge, with many costs being pushed to the undergraduate chapters and

Whereas Article II Section 3 of the Psi Upsilon Constitution requires each chapter alumni association to send one delegate to every convention and

Whereas several Alumni Associations have been absent from attending for years and

Whereas for Psi Upsilon to achieve its potential we must have all alumni associations involved and participating in the organization, therefore be it

Resolved that Psi Upsilon establish a modest "Alumni Association Fee" of \$750 per Alumni Association to be billed each October, similar to the "Chapter Services Fee", for each alumni group that has an active undergraduate chapter, colony or owl club and be it further

Resolved that payment of the fee will allow an alum, at the discretion of the alumni association, to have its convention registration waived similar to how official undergraduate convention delegates have their registration fees waived and be if further

Resolved that any alumni association that does not pay the fee is not recognized by Psi Upsilon Fraternity and does not receive any privileges of recognition, including being a participant in its General Liability Policy

Language to add to the Assessment Schedule (which explains all taxes and fees):

Alumni Association Fee - \$750 per year paid in 1 installment on November 1 by each Alumni Association or House Corporation and provides the following for each organization

> Convention Registration for official delegate Administrative privileges to MemberPlanet Database to send emails, generate alumni lists, create donation sites, and more Online Programming and Education like the Alumni Advisor Training, Recruitment Certification, and Townhalls

Logic of \$750 amount

Convention Registration: \$500

MemberPlanet and Contact Lists (and maintenance of database): \$100

Online Programming (Alumni Advisor Training) and Townhalls: \$100

Administrative Fee: \$50

If an alumni association also wants to be a part of our D&O insurance program it would cost \$1,500 (right now we charge \$750 for D&O insurance). You must be a recognized alumni association to receive D&O insurance.

HOW TO WRITE A RESOLUTION

All resolutions should be submitted to the Convention Recorder in writing on the forms provided. It is often advisable to consult with brothers who can be of assistance in perfecting it. A resolution is written, "Resolved: That the Fraternity shall know how to write resolutions..." It can consist of more than one resolving clause, as in the following example:

<u>Resolved</u>: That it is the sense of this Convention that a new edition of the Constitution be printed; and be it further.

<u>Resolved</u>: That the Executive Council is directed to fund, print and mail the new edition to each of the several chapters by May, 2016.

It is usually inadvisable to attempt to include reasons for a resolution's adoption within the resolution itself. Such an attempt may confuse an otherwise clear resolution. In cases where little-known information is needed to make the merits of a resolution understood, or where unusual importance is attached to making certain reasons for an action a matter of record, a preamble is placed before the resolving clauses. A preamble consists of one or more clauses beginning "Whereas." It should be emphasized that neither rule nor custom requires a resolution to have a preamble, and one should not be used merely for the sake of form.

Example of appropriate preamble:

<u>Whereas</u>: An informal survey taken by the Executive Council reveals that many chapter properties are seriously underinsured; be it

<u>Resolved</u>: That a committee of five, consisting of two alumni presidents and three Executive Council members, shall be appointed to draw up recommendations whereby the chapters may adequately insure themselves.

A preamble should contain no more clauses than are strictly necessary. If an elaborate resolution is necessary, the following will guide:

Whereas: The...(text of first preamble clause); and

Whereas: ...(text of next to last preamble clause); and

Whereas: ...(text of last preamble clause); be it

Resolved: That...(stating action to be taken); and be it further

Resolved: That...(stating further action to be taken); and be it further

Resolved: That...(stating still further action to be taken).

If there is a preamble, each clause, written as a separate paragraph, begins with the word

"Whereas," followed by a colon and the next word should begin with a capital letter. The preamble should never contain a period. Each of its paragraphs should close with a semi-colon, followed, in the case of all but the last paragraph, by the word "and." The last paragraph of the preamble should close with a semi-colon, after which a connecting expression such as "be it" or "therefore be it" is added. No punctuation should follow these phrases, and they are always placed at the end of the preamble paragraph, never at the beginning of the resolving paragraph.

The word "Resolved" is underlined or printed in italics and is followed by a colon and the word "That." If there is more than one resolving clause, each of them should be a separate paragraph. Each paragraph, except the last, should close with a semi-colon, followed by the words "and be it further;" the last paragraph should end with a period. A resolving paragraph should not contain a period within its structure.

2023-24 Proposed Assessment Schedule

Initiation Fee – \$250 per initiate due at the time of initiation.

Entitles an initiate to lifetime membership in Psi Upsilon Fraternity pursuant to Psi Upsilon Constitution Article IX §1: "Membership in any chapter and payment to the Fraternity of the initiation fees shall constitute membership in the Fraternity."

Tax – \$210 per undergraduate member in good standing due on October 1 or upon return from inactive or suspended status.

The initiation fee and tax provides the operating funds necessary to run Psi Upsilon Fraternity each year. The International Fraternity also receives revenue from educational grants from the Psi Upsilon Foundation and regular giving by dedicated alumni. The International Fraternity provides a wide range of services and resources to its chapters and alumni including campus visits, educational handbooks and manuals for officers and alumni, member database management, membership directories, newsletters, Archons Academy, Leadership Institute, Convention, expansion and reactivation of chapters, chapter retreats, preservation of historical documents in the Archives, insurance program management, web site, public relations, legislative advocacy, fund raising, crisis management, interfraternal relations, college and university relations, and event planning.

Chapter Services Fee – \$1,950 per year paid in 2 installments on November 1 and March 1. Provides the following for chapters:

- Registration, travel and room for president to Archons' Academy
- Registration and room for two (2) official delegates to Leadership Institute and Convention
- Access to MemberPlanet
- Alumni Key and certificate for Outstanding Junior
- Awards at Convention
- College Tablets and Pledge Pins

Risk Management Assessment – <u>Due October 1st</u>. Provides \$500,000 comprehensive general liability insurance for every chapter and alumni association and \$2 million comprehensive general liability insurance for every house corporation. Assessment is based on a number of factors including:

- Number of undergraduate members (as reported on the end of year report)
- Housing (housed or unhoused)
- Alcohol free chapter
- Past claims history of the chapter

This assessment also includes the Member Accident Protection Program (MAPP) for all undergraduate members and pledges in the United States (\$100,000 coverage for medical expenses resulting from accidental injury incurred during the academic year), changes to our Self Insurance Retention, Deductible deposit and other fees related to the Risk Management and insurance charges for the Fraternity. Chapters in Canada are not included in the MAPP program, and this is reflected in the amount they pay for the Risk Management Assessment.

Late Fees – Any chapter that has not paid its fees or taxes in full by its respective due date will receive a late fee of 1% per month, or \$10 total per month, whichever amount is greater.

ARTICLE XIII

AMENDMENT

Section 1. Conditions for amendment

PREAMBLE

We who are or were students in universities and colleges throughout the United States and Canada and who believe in similar principles of life and standards of human conduct, consider that the existence of a fraternal bond among us is eminently calculated best to promote our educational achievements, the development of our personal character and happiness, and the overall interests of the universities and colleges of which we are a part. We believe further that we may thereby better contribute to a continual improvement and expansion of the educational system of these two great nations.

Accordingly, we do hereby, in order to promote such purposes and the objects hereinafter set forth, adopt and solemnly pledge ourselves to sustain the following.

ARTICLE I

PRINCIPLES

- Section 1. The corporation shall be officially known and designated as Psi Upsilon Fraternity, a corporation organized under the non-profit corporation laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- Section 2. The motto of the Fraternity shall never be written, but with the grip shall be handed down traditionally.
- The objects of this Fraternity for which we stand united are: (1) To make a significant contribution to the colleges and universities with which its undergraduate and alumni members are associated, to the communities in which its members reside, and to the great countries of the United States of America and Canada; (2) To promote the adoption of significant life goals by its members, together with plans for their fulfillment; (3) The promotion of the highest moral, intellectual, and social excellence and educational standards in all its members; and (4) The union of all its members in a firm and enduring friendship and true brotherhood for life.
- The formal meeting of the chapters of Psi Upsilon shall be attended only by members of our fraternity. The minutes of such meetings shall be available only to members. The motto, the symbols, and the grip of Psi Upsilon shall never be disclosed to persons outside our fraternity membership. Informal meetings may be attended by non-members when appropriate, and with the consent of members present.
- Section 5. In order to carry out the objectives stated in Article I, Section 3, the individual chapters of Psi Upsilon will make every possible effort to provide for their members at the lowest possible cost the following: room, board, and library and study facilities. In addition, periodic meetings of a literary, cultural, and educational character shall be provided.
- **Section 6.** The official badge of the Fraternity shall be worn by members only.

ARTICLE II

GOVERNMENT OF THE FRATERNITY

- The Convention shall be the primary source of legislation governing the Fraternity. The Executive Council shall be the primary administrative arm of the Fraternity. The Executive Council shall likewise possess legislative power to deal with emergencies, adopt policy, and conduct the business of the Fraternity between Conventions subject to the approval of the ensuing Convention.
- Section 2. The Convention shall consist of accredited delegates representing the undergraduate membership and alumni of the Fraternity. It shall meet annually with one of the chapters as determined at a preceding Convention, or by the Executive Council in the absence of a decision at the preceding Convention, or if so delegated by the Convention. Factors influencing the selection of a Convention site shall include chapter anniversaries, the interval of time since chapters last hosted a Convention, geographic alternation, and benefits of maintenance or growth of a specific chapter or chapters and the Fraternity as a whole. Each chapter shall provide yearly funds sufficient to meet transportation and Convention costs for two undergraduate member delegates from that chapter to the Convention. The Executive Council, upon receipt by it of the annual reports encouraged by Article VIII, Section 1, shall notify the chapters of the amounts of their assessments, and no chapter shall be entitled to voting privileges at a Convention which, ten days prior to the meeting thereof, shall not have paid all assessments and other money payable by it to the treasury of the Fraternity, unless otherwise provided by the Convention.
- Each chapter shall send to the Convention, with written credentials, two of its undergraduate members as delegates, who shall be the official representatives of such active chapter and shall cast its votes. The official alumni organization of each chapter shall send one duly accredited delegate to the Convention with the power to cast one vote. Each chapter in Convention shall be entitled to one vote for each accredited delegate in attendance except as provided for in Article II, Section 2, above. A quorum shall consist of at least one accredited delegate from at least two-thirds of the active chapters.
- <u>Section 4.</u> The Executive Council shall designate three accredited delegates to each Convention, and each such delegate shall be entitled to cast one vote.

ARTICLE III

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The members of the Executive Council shall constitute and also be known as the Board of Directors of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity. The Executive Council shall be composed of not less than seven or more than nine alumni term members of the Fraternity, with the exact number to be determined from time-to-time by the Executive Council. There shall be no more than two alumni term members from the same chapter serving at the

same time. Alumni term members of the Executive Council shall be elected by the Convention for terms of one to five years. Their classes of service should be so arranged that two or more should be elected annually to fill vacancies caused by the expiration of terms.

- In addition to the elected alumni term members of the Executive Council, two undergraduate members of the Fraternity shall be elected by the Convention for terms of one year each, to serve as the Undergraduate Advisory Board and will be invited to attend meetings as non-voting members of the Executive Council.
- Section 3. In addition to the alumni members of the Executive Council, all living past presidents of the Executive Council shall be life members with full voting rights. All retiring members of the Executive Council who have served ten years or more may be elected honorary life members of the Executive Council without voting rights.
- Executive Council shall consider desirable for the Fraternity. The Executive Council shall elect a president, a vice president, a secretary and a treasurer, as well as an assistant secretary and an assistant treasurer, if desired; shall regulate its own proceedings and assignments of duty; and shall be empowered to employ a chief executive officer. The title, duties, and compensation of the chief executive officer will be determined by the Executive Council. Other members of the staff shall report to the chief executive officer and their compensation shall be determined by the chief executive officer in accordance with a salary administrative plan approved by the Executive Council. The chief executive officer shall serve as an ex-officio member of the Executive Council without voting privileges.
- Section 5. The Executive Council shall issue calls and make all arrangements for special Conventions, when requested so to do, in writing by at least five chapters; shall give official notice to all chapters of any measure requiring the consent of the chapters; and shall keep the Fraternity seal and all Fraternity personal property under its jurisdiction, including the official copy of the Constitution and Convention records, a copy of the by-laws of each chapter, and as complete statistics on them as possible. It shall have power under the regulations of each Convention to make and collect assessments from the several chapters including taxes and membership fees; shall settle or defend general claims against the Fraternity as a whole; and shall superintend the publication of Fraternity documents. The Executive Council shall fill its own vacancies for terms expiring with the next Convention and shall submit annually to the Convention a communication embracing a report of its actions, with recommendations with respect to the affairs of the Fraternity as it may deem proper. The Executive Council shall investigate applications for charters of the Fraternity and shall initiate inquiries into the expediency or desirability of establishing a chapter at any college or university.

ARTICLE IV

ESTABLISHMENT OF CHAPTERS

- Section 1. This Fraternity shall be constituted of chapters which have been or may be established in colleges and universities. Each chapter shall be designated by one or more initial letters of some Greek word or words having appropriate significance. An active chapter shall consist of two bodies. One such body, the undergraduate membership, shall be composed of undergraduates and students attending graduate school, and the second body shall be composed of alumni. An inactive chapter may consist of only the alumni body.
- The Executive Council shall be empowered to grant provisional chapter status to a group seeking to establish a chapter of Psi Upsilon upon recommendation of the chief executive officer, whenever the Executive Council believes that the group seeking affiliation will have the ability to meet the guidelines for a new chapter that have been established by the Convention.
- Approval from three-quarters of the active chapters shall be necessary for the establishment of a new chapter of this Fraternity. When the Executive Council believes that a provisional chapter has met the guidelines for establishing a new chapter, it shall instruct the chief executive officer to prepare a report and recommendation and mail same to each chapter's undergraduate membership and to the governing body of the alumni association or corporation. Within twenty days of such mailing, each body shall transmit to the chief executive officer at the International Office of the Fraternity its approval or disapproval in writing. Approval of a chapter shall occur under any of the following conditions:
 - (a) Two-thirds of the undergraduate membership and two-thirds of the governing body of the alumni association or corporation vote in favor of the proposal; or
 - (b) Two-thirds of either body votes in favor of the proposal, and the other body does not respond within twenty days of the date of the mailing concerning the proposed establishment of the new chapter; or
 - (c) Neither body responds to the proposal within twenty days of the date of the mailing concerning the establishment of the new chapter.
- Upon the chief executive officer receiving approval from three-fourths of the active chapters for establishing a new chapter, it shall be the duty of the Executive Council to prepare an exact copy of the Constitution and an official certification of the vote of the chapters, and with these documents to proceed immediately in person, if possible or, if not, to direct some chapter to appoint a committee to meet and initiate members of the new chapter with the usual ceremonies of initiation, by which they shall be invested with all the rights of a chapter.
- Section 5. When a chapter has been or shall be established upon application of undergraduate and graduate or alumni members, it shall be lawful for such chapter by unanimous vote to elect graduate or alumni members of such organization in good standing upon their

written application and to initiate them in due form.

- A petition for the establishment of a chapter at a branch of the same institution wherein a chapter of Psi Upsilon already exists will be considered by the Fraternity in the same manner as that prescribed for any other petition.
- Only chapters defined by this Constitution as inactive shall be reactivated. The Executive Council, in cooperation with the alumni organization of an inactive chapter, shall create an Owl Club at that chapter when a group of persons qualified for, and desirous of membership in, Psi Upsilon Fraternity, presents themselves for consideration. When the Executive Council, after receiving a recommendation from the alumni organization of that chapter or after its own investigation, determines that the Owl Club members are qualified for membership in Psi Upsilon, the Executive Council shall initiate the members, thereby extending to them membership in Psi Upsilon Fraternity. To this group and the alumni organization, together, shall be granted the status of an active chapter.

ARTICLE V

TERMINATION OF CHAPTERS

- Section 1. No chapter may dissolve or surrender its charter of its own volition. The undergraduate members of a chapter, its alumni organization, or the Executive Council may make a recommendation for the termination of a chapter's active status to the Convention.
- Section 2. A chapter shall be considered inactive if no living members exist and no other action has been taken by the Fraternity with regard to establishing their status.
- Section 3. The Executive Council may relegate the chapter to an inactive status as defined in Article IV, Section 1, if a possibility of the chapter's future reactivation is deemed to exist.
- Section 4. The Executive Council may suspend the charter of an active chapter for a specified period of time, removing all rights of undergraduate membership within Psi Upsilon until specific conditions are met.
- Section 5. The action of the Executive Council to relegate a chapter to inactive status pursuant to Section 3 or 4 above shall become final unless an appeal of that action to the Convention is received by the executive director of the Fraternity within 30 days of the date of the official notice by the Executive Council to the chapter of its decision to relegate the chapter to inactive status. If a timely notice of appeal is received, the next Convention will consider and act on the appeal by a three fourths vote of the accredited delegates.
- Section 6. Where a chapter (a) lacks sufficient membership to sustain itself financially, or as a part of the university or college community, (b) lacks sufficient organized alumni support to keep itself as a healthy and contributing member of fraternity life on its

campus, (c) finds itself in a financial condition where it can no longer maintain its solvency, (d) fails to meet its assessment obligations to the Executive Council on a continuing basis, (e) fails to carry out on a continuing basis an effective rushing program, thereby failing to provide the chapter with the new members necessary to sustain its existence, or (f) is confronted with other serious conditions affecting the normal existence of a college or university fraternity chapter, and, furthermore, fails to correct any of the foregoing conditions after strenuous and organized efforts have been made to assist it, the Executive Council, upon finding any such condition to be present, may take action under Section 1 through 4 of this Article.

Section 7. If the charter of a chapter is revoked or suspended, or if the chapter is relegated to an inactive status, all official Fraternity records, seals, official documents, memorabilia, and any material pertaining to the chapter's relation to the Fraternity as a whole shall be placed in the custody of the Executive Council.

ARTICLE VI

CHAPTER RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Each chapter shall have power to provide for its own organization and proceedings in such a manner as it may see fit, so far as such provisions do not conflict with this Constitution or the Policies of Psi Upsilon Fraternity.
- Each chapter should take action as early as possible on the receipt of the records of any Convention upon all measures which require such action, and within one week thereafter should notify the Executive Council of the result.
- The alumni body of each chapter should incorporate itself and should hold at least one Section 3. meeting a year to which all the members of the chapter's alumni body shall be invited. At such meetings, an annual report of the operation of the chapter should be rendered, covering the activities of the undergraduates and the alumni. A board of trustees, or its counterpart, composed of alumni of the chapter, should be established to conduct the business of the alumni corporation. The election of members to such a body, as vacancies exist or as terms of such expire, shall be held at such annual meetings. The purpose of such alumni corporation shall be (1) to conduct the business affairs of the corporation, (2) to aid in the financial operation of the chapter, (3) to support the educational and risk management programs of Psi Upsilon, (4) to cooperate, as appropriate, with the administration of the institution where the chapter is located, (5) to hold title to and ownership of the chapter house where such is feasible, and (6) to support the actions of the Executive Council pertaining to its respective undergraduate chapter. The board of trustees should meet at least two or more times a year with at least one such meeting to be held at their respective chapter houses. Such procedure will permit the board of trustees to maintain close contact with the affairs of the undergraduates and of the house and to review communications between the Executive Council or Convention, and the chapter.

ARTICLE VII

UNDERGRADUATE MEMBER LEADERSHIP

- Each chapter should have for its officers an archon, a grammateus, a thesauristes and one or more angeloi and epistolographoi, whose general duties should be those of a president, recording secretary, treasurer, vice president, corresponding secretary and alumni relations secretary respectively, to whom also special duties may be assigned by the laws of the chapter. Special officers may also be elected by a chapter for the performance of duties peculiar to itself. These officers should be elected by ballot at such times as each chapter may decide, provided that an election of all be held at least once a year.
- Section 2. The epistolographos or epistolographoi should communicate with each chapter and its alumni body at least once in every collegiate term; should give due notice of all changes of officers, of all initiations, expulsions, suspensions, or graduations; and should keep the Fraternity well informed of the state of their chapter, and their chapter of the condition of the Fraternity.
- Section 3. In order that a continuous history of each chapter may be kept and thereby a history of the Fraternity as a whole, the grammateus should prepare at the end of each academic year a full report of the chapter and of its activities for that year, including the activities of both the undergraduate and alumni bodies of the chapter. Copies of such reports should be forwarded to the International Office Staff for preservation in the archives of the Fraternity, and to the officers of the chapter alumni organization.

ARTICLE VIII

CHAPTER REPORTS

Section 1. The Executive Council should encourage the chapters to report such information concerning each chapter's officers, pledges, initiates, undergraduate members and activities as deemed necessary by the Executive Council.

ARTICLE IX

MEMBERSHIP

- Membership in any chapter and payment to the Fraternity of the initiation fees shall constitute membership in the Fraternity. Members shall be called "brothers." Each chapter may develop its own qualifications for membership, except that there may be no discrimination in membership selection prohibited by the laws of the applicable nation, but no chapter shall initiate any person or persons to membership who are not recognized as students in good standing by the faculty and trustees of the college or university in which the chapter is located.
- **Section 2.** The election of any person to membership shall be in accordance with the regulations

of the university or college at which the chapter is located. The qualifications for membership shall be determined by each chapter, such determination to take into consideration the candidate's qualifications with respect to the general standards of the Fraternity as a whole and to the standards set by the membership of that chapter.

The Executive Council may select from those individuals affiliated with a provisional chapter, persons to be initiated as members of the Fraternity. Said members-at-large shall have all the rights and privileges of any member associated with a chapter, excluding those conferred in Article II, Section 2 of this Constitution. The Executive Council shall be responsible for initiating all successive initiates to the provisional chapter. At the time of installation of the provisional chapter, those members previously initiated at that respective provisional chapter are conferred full membership in Psi Upsilon.

- The members of each chapter shall be considered as undergraduate or alumni. The undergraduates and members attending graduate school shall constitute the active chapter. During a period in which the undergraduate brothers are called to active military service, and until the expiration of one month after the first annual Convention following such active service, any alumni members of a chapter may become members of such active chapter, notwithstanding any other provisions in this Constitution.
- Section 5. The dissolution of a member's connection in any way with the university or college in which the member was an undergraduate member shall place the member on the alumni list, unless the member again becomes an undergraduate.
- Section 6. No person unconnected with the Fraternity coming from a university or college in which this Fraternity is represented by a chapter shall be anywhere elected to membership without taking into consideration the wishes of the former chapter, which will invariably be consulted.
- Any brother leaving the chapter into which initiated and becoming a student at any university or college in which there is or may be a chapter of this Fraternity shall be given preferential treatment in the last-named chapter.
- Section 8. This Constitution recognizes no withdrawal from membership in the Fraternity and maintains that an undergraduate brother should remain an active member of the chapter while an undergraduate in the university or college where initiated or while an undergraduate of another institution wherein there is a chapter. However, if an undergraduate member of the Fraternity indicates inability to meet financial responsibilities to the chapter, and if the undergraduate membership determines by a three-fourths vote to absolve such financial responsibility, then such undergraduate member may be granted inactive status. The Executive Council may, in its discretion, and for just cause, relieve any undergraduate or group of undergraduates of any chapter, of their annual Fraternity dues to the Executive Council. If an undergraduate member, while in attendance, requests such relief of obligations to the chapter for any reason or reasons and insists upon being so relieved, after a full hearing before the chapter in a meeting called for this purpose, then inactive status may be granted, but

only after every effort has been exhausted in discouraging inactive status.

- Suspension, expulsion, or fines should be the means of discipline within the undergraduate membership of all the chapters, under regulations to be established by themselves. The vote upon suspension or expulsion should be taken by ballot after at least two weeks of consideration and should require a three-fourths affirmative vote of all the undergraduate members of the chapter.
- Disciplinary action may also be taken by the alumni organization of a chapter or by the Executive Council. Any disciplinary action shall be fully documented and immediately relayed to the entire undergraduate membership of such chapter. This decision may be reviewed by the annual Convention as the final authority, at the request of the affected members or chapter. Under no circumstances may disciplinary action be taken against any undergraduate member or alumni member or members of a chapter if such action is contrary to law or to the rules and regulations of the university or college where the chapter is located.
- Section 11. In recognition of outstanding achievement and devotion to the Fraternity and its development and growth, a chapter may select from those not otherwise eligible for membership under this Article, persons to be designated as honorary members. Such honorary members shall not be entitled to any of the rights and privileges provided under Article II, Section 2, and Article III, Section 1, of this Constitution, provided, however, that honorary members shall have the right to attend the chapter meetings.

ARTICLE X

MEMBER EDUCATION

- New members shall be welcomed into Psi Upsilon in strict accordance with the initiation ritual published by the Executive Council and distributed to the active chapters. The initiation ritual may be amended or superseded by a three-fourths affirmative vote of the Convention.
- Section 2. Psi Upsilon Fraternity believes that a constructive member education program lies at the heart of a good fraternity experience. It stands for a member education process that seeks to:
 - a. Provide a thorough and comprehensive orientation to Psi Upsilon, its history, international structure, philosophy, values and ideals, traditions, songs and programs;
 - b. Create a sense of responsibility and commitment to the college or university and to Psi Upsilon.
 - c. Develop a sense of unity and camaraderie within the brotherhood.
 - d. Provide a working knowledge of how the chapter operates, both as an organization and as a physical plant.
 - e. Develop a clear understanding of the member's future role in the chapter and the contributions the member can make as a brother.

- f. Encourage and motivate the member to develop potential managerial and leadership skills.
- g. Guide the member toward improvement as an individual and as a member of the community.
- Section 3. Consistent with a constructive member education program, Psi Upsilon Fraternity declares itself unalterably opposed to hazing in any form or under any circumstances. Hazing is defined as any activity of the Fraternity or of its individual members which:
 - a. Causes or is likely to cause mental or physical harm, discomfort, embarrassment, harassment, ridicule, damage or injury.
 - b. Disrupts an individual's academic interests and pursuits, adversely affects an individual's normal lifestyle, or asks an individual to violate any government laws or college regulations.
 - c. Creates an impression that is detrimental to the public image of Psi Upsilon. The forced consumption of alcoholic beverages or drugs is strictly prohibited; or
 - d. Meets the definition of hazing provided by applicable provincial, state, federal law, or educational institution.
- <u>Section 4.</u> Any chapter which violates these principles shall be subject to disciplinary action by the Executive Council or by a three-fourths vote at the ensuing Convention.

ARTICLE XI

BADGE

The badge of this Fraternity shall be a lozenge-shaped breast-pin of gold, having in front, on a ground of black enamel, the clasped hands, with the letter "\P" above and "\Y" below; and on the reverse the name of the owner, with the appropriate chapter characteristic, graduating class, and month and year of initiation. This shall be the only official badge of the Fraternity, but no prohibition is made with reference to the wearing of such other style badge as the chapter may procure.

ARTICLE XII

FRATERNITY DOCUMENTS

- Section 1. A directory of all the members of the Fraternity shall be published as often as may be deemed advisable, containing the full names of the brothers, their residences and any other items of interest.
- Section 2. Collections of Fraternity songs shall be published whenever the necessities of the chapters shall demand them.
- **Section 3.** Special care shall be taken to secure the writing of accurate histories of the Fraternity

and its several chapters, to be published if deemed advisable.

Section 4. Copies of the records of every Convention shall be transmitted to each chapter. Every chapter shall keep each of the others informed of all laws adopted for its own government.

ARTICLE XIII

AMENDMENT

This Constitution may be amended or superseded by a three-fourths affirmative vote of the Convention, and such action shall be binding unless objected to by one-fourth or more of the active chapters within two weeks in term time after receipt of the official records of the Convention by the chapters.

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION

This edition of the Constitution of Psi Upsilon Fraternity includes all amendments that have been made to the Constitution through the 178th Convention held in 2022.

RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN PSI UPSILON FRATERNITY AND ITS UNDERGRADUATE CHAPTERS AND MEMBERS

Psi Upsilon Fraternity, Inc. is a non-profit corporation incorporated under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Its offices are located in Indianapolis, Indiana. Psi Upsilon's chapters are located in the United States and Canada.

Psi Upsilon was founded for the purpose of fostering fraternity and to be an educational and service resource for its undergraduate chapters and for members associated with those chapters. Psi Upsilon Fraternity maintains and processes membership and other records for its undergraduate chapters. As a result of limited funding sources, Psi Upsilon Fraternity has a very small staff.

Psi Upsilon Fraternity serves as an educational resource and service organization for its undergraduates and alumni, alumni chapter corporations and for local alumni who volunteer their time on an independent basis to assist an undergraduate chapter and its undergraduate members. Psi Upsilon Fraternity provides education through seminars, conferences, written materials, and periodic professional staff visits to undergraduate chapters. Professional staff visits may result in advisory recommendations for chapter operations. Psi Upsilon Fraternity strives through these educational efforts to enhance life skills, develop leadership ability and promote ethical conduct for those who take advantage of these educational opportunities, and to assist through education and consultant recommendations, the success of chapters associated with it.

No chapter of Psi Upsilon Fraternity and no member of any chapter of Psi Upsilon is an agent of Psi Upsilon Fraternity. No chapter and no member of any chapter has been appointed as an agent of Psi Upsilon Fraternity. No chapter and no member of any chapter has the authority to enter into any agreement on behalf of, or to bind Psi Upsilon Fraternity in any way. Psi Upsilon Fraternity is not and cannot be involved in the day-to-day operations of an undergraduate chapter. Psi Upsilon Fraternity does not and cannot control or supervise the day-to-day activities of an undergraduate chapter.

Each undergraduate chapter of Psi Upsilon Fraternity is a self-governing, financially self-sufficient association composed of students of the institution to which the chapter is affiliated, formally or informally. Each alumni chapter association of Psi Upsilon Fraternity is a self-governing, financially self-sufficient association composed of members chosen by that alumni association. Under the Constitution of Psi Upsilon Fraternity, each undergraduate chapter of Psi Upsilon selects and initiates its own members, elects its own officers, establishes its own rules, operates and determines its methods of operation, and governs its own affairs, subject only to those rules and operations being in harmony with Psi Upsilon's policies and Constitution. The autonomy of an undergraduate chapter in organizing, determining and conducting its own operations through a democracy is part of an educational process which enhances the undergraduate experience and the development of leadership skills.

Psi Upsilon Fraternity does not have the right to suspend or affect the membership

status of an undergraduate student associated with a chapter other than as specifically set forth in the Constitution of Psi Upsilon Fraternity.

If an undergraduate chapter's operations are not in harmony with Psi Upsilon's policies or Constitution, Psi Upsilon has the right after the fact to determine whether that chapter will continue to be recognized by Psi Upsilon as a chapter. In some situations, after an action by a chapter has occurred that is not in harmony with the policies or Constitution of Psi Upsilon Fraternity, a probationary status may be implemented for the chapter by Psi Upsilon. In probationary situations, the chapter continues to be a self-governing, financially self-sufficient association of undergraduate students. If a chapter ceases to be recognized by Psi Upsilon as a chapter but nonetheless continues its operations, it does so without any affiliation with Psi Upsilon.

Psi Upsilon Risk Management Policy Last amended 7/26/2019

The Risk Management Policy of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity first adopted in 1988 and as thereafter amended, applies to all members, all chapters, provisional chapters, Owl Clubs, colonies and all alumni groups unless written exemption is granted by the Executive Council.

Alcohol and Drugs

- 1. The possession, sale, use, or consumption of alcoholic beverages, while on chapter premises or during a fraternity event, in any situation sponsored or endorsed by the chapter, or in any event an observer would reasonably associate with the fraternity, must be in compliance with any and all applicable laws of the nation, state, province, county, city, and institution of higher education.
- 2. Common sources of alcohol, including bulk quantities, which are not being served by a licensed and insured third party vendor, are prohibited (i.e., amounts of alcohol greater than what a reasonable person should consume over the duration of an event).
- 3. Alcohol products above 15% ABV (30 proof) will be prohibited on all chapter premises or at any chapter event, except when served by a licensed and insured third-party vendor.
- 4. Alcoholic beverages must either be:
 - a. Provided and sold on a per-drink basis by a licensed and insured third-party vendor (e.g., restaurant, bar, caterer, etc.); or
 - b. Brought by individual members and guests through a bring your own beverage ("BYOB") system.

Alcoholic beverages must not be purchased with undergraduate chapter funds or funds pooled by members or guests (e.g., admission fees, cover fees, collecting funds through digital apps, etc.).

- 5. Open parties, meaning those with unrestricted access by non-members of the fraternity, without specific invitation, where alcohol is present, shall be prohibited. Attendance at events with alcohol is limited to a 3:1 maximum guest-to-member ratio, and must not exceed local fire or building code capacity of the chapter/organizational premises or host venue.
- 6. An undergraduate chapter must not co-host or co-sponsor, or in any way participate in, an activity or event with another group or entity that purchases or provides alcohol.
- 7. No members, collectively or individually, shall purchase for, serve to, or sell alcoholic beverages to any minor (i.e., those under legal "drinking age").
- 8. The possession, sale, or use of any illegal drugs or controlled substances while on chapter premises or during a fraternity event, or at any event that an observer would associate with the fraternity, is strictly forbidden.
- 9. No chapter may co-sponsor an event with an alcohol distributor, charitable organization, or tavern (tavern defined as an establishment generating more than half of annual gross sales from alcohol) where alcohol is given away, sold, or otherwise provided to those present. A chapter may rent or use a room or area in a tavern as defined above for an event held within the provisions of this policy.
- 10. All recruitment or rush activities associated with any chapter will be non-alcoholic. No recruitment or rush activities associated with any chapter may be held at, or in conjunction with, an alcohol distributor or

tavern as defined in this policy.

- 11. No member or pledge/associate member/novice shall permit, tolerate, encourage, or participate in "drinking games" with hard liquor or which involves duress, excess drinking or encouragement related to the consumption of alcohol.
- 12. No alcohol shall be present at any pledge/associate member/novice program, activity or ritual of the chapter. This includes, but is not limited to activities associated with "bid night," "big brother—little brother" events or activities, "family" events or activities, and initiation.

Hazing

No chapter, colony, student or alumnus shall conduct or condone hazing activities. Permission or approval by a person being hazed is not a defense. Hazing is any action taken or situation created intentionally that causes embarrassment, harassment, intimidation or ridicule, risks emotional or physical harm to members whether initiated or not, regardless of the person's willingness to participate.

Sexual Abuse and Harassment

The fraternity will not tolerate or condone any form of sexist or sexually abusive behavior on the part of its members, whether physical, mental, or emotional. This is to include any actions activities or events, whether on chapter premises or at an off-site location which are demeaning to women or men, such as verbal harassment. The fraternity will not tolerate sexual assault in any form. The employment or use of strippers, exotic dancers or similar, whether professional or amateur, at a fraternity event as defined in this policy, is prohibited.

Fire, Health, and Safety

All chapter houses should meet all local fire and health codes and standards.

All chapters should post emergency numbers for fire, police, and ambulance, and should have posted evacuation routes on the back of the door of each sleeping room.

All chapters should address engineering recommendations as reported by the insurance company or municipal authorities.

The possession and/or use of firearms or explosive or incendiary devices of any kind within the confines and premises of the chapter house are expressly forbidden.

Education

Each chapter shall annually instruct its students in these risk management standards. Additionally, all students and alumni organizations shall annually receive a copy of the Psi Upsilon Risk Management Standards.

Psi Upsilon Fraternity Policy Regarding Reporting of Incidents Involving Bodily Injury or Property Damage

When an incident occurs as a result of a fraternity-related activity (official and "unofficial") or while on Fraternity property, causing bodily injury or property damage to any person, the incident must be reported to the Fraternity's Executive Director within 24 hours. The Executive Director will determine the actions to be taken subsequently.

While reporting of all incidents involving bodily injury or property damage is required, timely reporting of incidents involving the following is critical:

- Fatality
- Spinal cord injury
- Brain injury
- Severe burns
- Total or partial blindness
- Amputation
- Permanent disability
- Multiple fractures
- Sexual assault and misconduct

The chapter must also immediately report to the Fraternity's Executive Director:

- Any hazing incidents
- Any lawsuits or subpoenas served on you, your chapter or on Psi Upsilon Fraternity by an officer of the court.
- Any contacts by an attorney or investigator asking about an occurrence that happened at the Fraternity or that involved Fraternity members.

Failure to report incidents may breach Psi Upsilon's duty to notify our insurance carrier of potential claims and may result in a loss of coverage.

Medical Good Samaritan Policy

Individual

If a member assists another person in obtaining immediate and appropriate medical care related to the use or consumption of alcohol, drugs, or to another medical emergency, then that member, as well as those who are assisted, will not be subject to individual disciplinary action from the Executive Council of Psi Upsilon with respect to the incident. This is the case even if the member who is assisting was a contributing factor to that emergency. Abuse of the policy may receive stricter scrutiny.

Chapter

A chapter that seeks immediate and appropriate medical care for a person in need related to the use or consumption of alcohol, drugs, or to another medical emergency, may be eligible for mitigation of charges from the Executive Council of Psi Upsilon related to violations of organizational policies. To be eligible for this potential mitigation, the chapter will be required to meet in person or by phone with an international staff member or an alumni volunteer designated by the Executive Council. Abuse of the policy may receive stricter scrutiny.

Whereas: Members and chapters who fail in their primary obligation to the International

Fraternity unfairly place the financial burden of membership in Psi Upsilon on

their brothers; and

Whereas: No brother or chapter should be allowed to use the name, history, and heritage of

Psi Upsilon Fraternity without meeting their primary obligation to the Fraternity;

therefore be it

Resolved: Any chapter unable to pay an invoiced assessment should contact the office of the

International Fraternity before the obligation is due, to establish a suitable payment schedule. If full payment of the obligation is not made nor a suitable payment schedule is arranged within thirty (30) days after the mailing of the invoice, notice will be sent to the chapter president and the chapter alumni president that unless full payment is made or a suitable payment schedule is arranged immediately, the chapter shall be required to contract with a chapter financial services company acceptable to the Executive Council within fifteen

(15) days.

If payment is not made, a suitable payment schedule arranged with the office of the International Fraternity, or a contract with a financial services company signed within the aforementioned time frame (45) days of the original invoiced mailing, the Executive Council may suspend the charter of the said chapter until such time as payment is made or a suitable payment schedule has been arranged.

Notice of the suspension of the charter for failure to meet financial obligations shall be given to the chapter president, the chapter alumni president, and, at the discretion of the Executive Council, notice may also be provided to other parties, as appropriate.

Psi Upsilon Policies Regarding Pledge Reports, Membership Fees, and Badges

Pledge Reports

The Pledge Report is the critical first step in obtaining accurate information about our members. As an incentive for the timely submission of the Pledge Report, *College Tablets* and pledge pins are shipped to the chapter without charge. If the Pledge Report is submitted late; i.e., after the pledge has been initiated, the chapter or individual may purchase the *College Tablet* for \$25 and a pledge pin for \$10.

Membership Fee

Psi Upsilon's Constitution provides that membership in a chapter and payment to the International Fraternity of the initiation fee, constitutes membership in the Fraternity. Stated differently, if the membership fee is not paid, the initiate is not a member of Psi Upsilon and runs the risk of being stricken from the rolls. The Membership Fee is due at the time of initiation and in order to encourage prompt payment of the Membership Fee, Psi Upsilon provides a badge and certificate for each brother whose initiation is reported, and whose membership fee is paid, on a timely basis.

Badges

In order to receive badges and membership certificates on a complementary basis, a brother's initiation be must be reported and the membership fee paid, during the fiscal year in which he is initiated. Psi Upsilon's fiscal year ends on June 30. A brother whose initiation fee is paid after June 30 may receive a badge and certificate upon payment of \$65.00.

Psi Upsilon Fraternity Policy Regarding Wearing of Badges

Resolved: That Psi Upsilon badges shall be worn over the heart on

the breast pocket of a vest or shirt, and not on open display.

Psi Upsilon Fraternity Policy Regarding Trademarks

Official versions of the Fraternity insignia shall be protected by trademark registration. The design or representation of the badge, coat-of-arms, chapter coat-of-arms, Executive Council seal, pledge button, flag, Greek and/or Roman letters Psi Upsilon and the words "Psi Upsilon" when used in combination to denote Psi Upsilon Fraternity shall not be manufactured, created, used or offered for sale by any person, company or firm except as specifically authorized in writing by the Executive Council or its designee.

Only the Executive Council or its designee may authorize commercial reproduction of the Fraternity's insignia including the words "Psi Upsilon," any design or presentation of the badge, coat-of-arms, chapter coat-of-arms, Executive Council seal, pledge button, flag, Greek and/or Roman letters Psi Upsilon and the words "Psi Upsilon" when used in combination to denote Psi Upsilon Fraternity. Anyone wishing to acquire merchandise bearing any insignia of the Fraternity shall obtain those items only from vendors that are currently authorized to produce or market official Psi Upsilon merchandise.

Active chapters may utilize local commercial firms to produce material for their own chapter needs as long as such material is approved by the Executive Council or its designee. Any text or design which casts the Fraternity in a negative light or is otherwise contrary to the ideals of the Fraternity, specifically including but not limited to any materials deemed to promote alcohol abuse or illegal substance use or any material considered to be sexist or demeaning to women or other persons, will not be approved.

Diversity and Inclusion Policy

Psi Upsilon promotes the highest level of moral, intellectual, and social excellence, which includes fostering an environment of respectful and civil discourse, and encouraging each member to use their individual talents and abilities for the benefit of the Fraternity, campus life, and society.

Identifying diversity is to recognize the differences and similarities in the characteristics and attributes that make each one of us unique. These can include, but are not limited to, an individual's; race, ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, gender, physical ability, age, school of political thought or socioeconomic background. Diversity can also encompass where people are from, where they have lived, and differences in their core beliefs and life experiences.

Diversity in our membership does not threaten our common bonds, but rather leads to a richer dialogue between members, yields a deeper and more meaningful college experience, and provides greater opportunities for our members' individual personal growth.

Brothers are expected to reach out to those who share the values of Psi Upsilon, and to harness our membership's differing talents and passions to improve the chapter, their campus, and themselves.

Rulemaking Policy

The Executive Council of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity is empowered by the Psi Upsilon Constitution to make changes to fraternity policy between Conventions. In order to ensure that chapters and alumni leadership

- are aware of any such policy changes,
- have an opportunity to voice any questions or concerns they have about new policies, and
- are given sufficient time to implement the changes,

the Executive Council will follow this procedure when making any material change to fraternity policy. This procedure in no way changes or limits the ability, guaranteed by the Constitution, of the Convention to review the Executive Council's actions.

- 1. **Notice of new policy discussion:** When possible, the Executive Council will send a notice to chapter and alumni leadership in advance of regularly scheduled meetings with a short summary of any policy changes they expect to discuss.
- 2. **Notice of policy changes:** Following each meeting of the Executive Council, they will send a notice to chapter and alumni leadership containing all policy changes approved at that meeting.
- 3. **Comment period:** Notices as described above will include a link to a page on the Fraternity website allowing comments on the proposed or accepted changes. The Executive Council will review those comments and may reopen discussion or amend the policy.
- 4. Effective dates: Barring exceptional circumstances:
- Any changes approved during a Convention will take effect no earlier than one month from the closing of that Convention.
- Any changes approved outside of a Convention will take effect no earlier than the next Convention.
- 5. **Emergency changes:** In cases relating to health and safety of members, or other emergencies, the Executive Council may make policy changes with no prior notice and with immediate effect. In these cases, the Executive Council will still provide notice of these changes to chapter and alumni leadership after passage, and such notice will include an explanation of the reasons for emergency action.

Adopted by the Executive Council March 6, 2021

Psi Upsilon Policy on Academics and Intellectual Engagement

Psi Upsilon believes fraternity should foster both individual and chapter support for the academic mission of the college and that the fraternity should create opportunities for co-curricular learning and personal development. To further this effort Psi Upsilon expects every chapter to maintain an academic and Intellectual Engagement Program and have a chairman or officer monitor the performance of every undergraduate brother.

Psi Upsilon also recognizes that Intellectual Engagement goes beyond just academics and that fraternity, when done correctly, should support a marginal student looking to improve their academic performance. In addition:

- Every member joining a chapter of Psi Upsilon Fraternity must have a cumulative high school or college, if established, GPA of 2.5, or a previous semester college GPA of 3.0. If they fall below this threshold their membership should be deferred until their GPA improves.
- Every member of Psi Upsilon must maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 2.7 or a GPA of 3.0 for the previous semester, or above the all men's (if single sex) or all campus (if coed), whichever is greater. If their cumulative GPA falls below this mark the brother should set up a plan for improvement with their chapter's academic chair. Continued unwillingness to work to improve their academic standing, may lead to suspension from the fraternity.
- Every chapter that has a GPA below the all men's (if single sex) or all campus (if coed), must submit a plan for improvement to the International Office.
- Every chapter should host events that encourage the intellectual growth of its chapter members. This can involve guest lectures by professors, workshops by college staff or departments, events where alumni speak about their personal and professional experiences, or chapter mentorship programs.

Adopted by the Executive Council on July 22, 2022

Policy on Legacies

A Chapter should not assume that a legacy prospect will automatically accept an invitation to membership because of their relative's membership in Psi Upsilon nor should an individual automatically be entitled to membership on the basis of such a relationship. The Fraternity recognizes, however, that the most interested candidates for membership are often those who are legacies or who have been recommended for membership by alumni members. They should be given the utmost careful consideration and attention as prospective members and their recruitment process should be transparent and any reasons for not extending an invitation to join should be expressed to the alumni association as well as any alumni making the recommendation.

Where a legacy candidate or candidates recommended by an alum has been brought to the attention of the Chapter, the members have an obligation to introduce themselves to the candidate, invite them to any recruitment events and to investigate the possibility of asking them to join. It is the responsibility of the alum to make sure the recommendation is in fact received by the Chapter and not merely by an individual. To effectively ensure this, it is recommended that the alum contact the appropriate staff member at the International Office to ensure the recommendation gets to both the Alumni and Undergraduate Chapter. You can email information to legacies@psiu.org or fill out this form.

Letters of recommendation submitted to the Chapter by an alum on behalf of a prospective member should be courteously acknowledged by the Chapter's Archon or Recruitment Chairman. It is then the responsibility of the recruitment chairman to notify the alum of the outcome of the recruitment period and express any concerns regarding the potential member to the Alumni Association, as appropriate.

A "legacy" is defined, in the context of this policy, as "the relative of a member of the Fraternity in good standing."

Adopted by the Executive Council July 22, 2022

Legacy Policy Steps/Procedure

- 1) Alumni will notify the International Office of legacy attending a campus with a Chapter of Psi Upsilon.
- 2) International Office will notify said chapter's: Archon, Recruitment Chairman, Alumni President and any Alumni Advisor of potential member, Psi Upsilon's Legacy Policy, and contact information for the alumni who made the recommendation (if provided).
- 3) The chapter will include the potential member in their recruitment process, as appropriate.
- 4) The chapter leadership will report any known concerns about the potential member to the Alumni Association and/or International Office in advance of any decision.
- 5) A final decision regarding an invitation to join will be provided to the Alumni Association and International Office once reached.
- 6) The International Office will ensure any alumni who made a recommendation is followed up with and appropriate information is provided if the chapter decides to not extend a bid to a member.
- 7) During the New Member Education process if there are any concerns about the potential member, they should be shared with the Alumni Association and International Office. If a chapter decides to terminate the membership of a legacy prior to initiation, the reasons should be shared with the Alumni Association and/or International Office prior to any vote on the matter taking place.
- 8) An alum does not have to follow these steps to recommend a member for membership, and the spirit of this policy should always be followed by a chapter, but it is recommended to help ensure the correct members are notified and follow up can occur.

CONVENTION RECORDS



Psi Upsilon Convention Rules

I

The Convention of the Fraternity shall be the primary source of legislation governing the Fraternity (Article II, Section 1 of the Constitution). It shall be convened annually in accordance with Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution. To fulfill its function and accomplish its purpose, the Convention shall be conducted according to long-standing procedures, subject to periodic modifications as circumstances develop.

II

An accredited delegate of the Executive Council or a representative of the host chapter shall call the Convention to order and shall appoint a Temporary President and Temporary Recorder.

Ш

Thereafter the Temporary President shall appoint a committee to deal with credentials and permanent organization, which shall consist of not less than three accredited delegates.

IV

The Convention shall consist of accredited delegates representing the undergraduates and alumni of the Fraternity (Article II, Section 2). Each chapter shall send to the Convention, with written credentials, two of its undergraduate members as delegates, who shall be the official representatives of such undergraduate chapters and shall cast its votes (Article II, Section 3). The official alumni organization of each chapter shall send one duly accredited delegate to the Convention with the power to cast one vote (Article II, Section 4). The Executive Council shall designate three accredited delegates to each Convention, and each such delegate shall be entitled to cast one vote (Article II, Section 4).

V

Each chapter in Convention shall be entitled to one vote for each accredited delegate in attendance (Article II, Section 3). No delegate to the Convention, regardless of whether or not representing more than one certified interest, shall be given more than one vote. All undergraduates and alumni of the Fraternity, and also invited guests, shall be welcome to attend and to participate in general and committee meetings, but without voting privileges.

VI

A quorum shall consist of accredited delegates from at least two-thirds of the active chapters (Article II, Section 3). It is expected that every active chapter shall be represented. No chapter shall be entitled to voting privileges at a Convention which, ten days prior to the meeting thereof, shall not have paid all assessments and other money payable to the treasury of the Fraternity, unless otherwise provided by the Convention (Article II, Section 2).

VII

The permanent officers shall be a President, one or more Vice Presidents, a Recorder, and one or more Assistant Recorders. The President shall preside at all general meetings of the Convention. In the event of his absence, disability, or expressed wish, the Vice President or in the case of more than one Vice President, the oldest in class seniority, shall preside. The Recorder and the one or more Assistant Recorders shall record the proceedings of the Convention, and within seven days of the final adjournment, they shall transmit to the Executive

Office the records and papers relating to the Convention.

VIII

Upon reconvening, the Convention shall receive and act upon the report of the Committee on Credentials and Permanent Organization. The Permanent President shall thereupon succeed the Temporary President as the presiding officer. He shall appoint one or more Parliamentarians. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be the general authority for procedure.

IX

The Convention shall receive the Annual Communication of the Executive Council, which shall include a report of the general state of the Fraternity, a review of the activities and developments since the last Convention, a projection of future activities and directions, a description of pending or anticipated matters, and proposals for the consideration of the Convention.

X

The Convention shall also receive a report from every active chapter, which shall include membership statistics, academic and campus standing, financial condition, unique features, highlights of the previous year, philanthropic activities, principal concerns, and a projection for next year.

<u>XI</u>

The President may appoint Standing Committees of four or more delegates, including undergraduates and alumni, to address pertinent issues facing the Fraternity, encompassing singly or in combination at least the following: awards, budget, future Convention sites, new business, nominations to the Executive Council, nominations to the Alumni Advisory Board, and unfinished business.

XII

Convention time thereafter shall be apportioned between committee meetings and general meetings. All resolutions and recommendations approved by a standing or special committee shall be referred to the Rules Committee which shall be composed of all standing and special committee chairmen, three alumni members appointed by the Permanent President of the Convention, and the Parliamentarian of the Convention, who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee. The Rules Committee shall determine the order in which resolutions, recommendations, and reports may be considered in the general meetings of the Convention and may return resolutions and recommendations to committees if they duplicate prior resolutions and/or recommendations already considered appropriately by other Convention committees. Committee Chairmen shall present the preliminary and final reports at general meetings, in the order determined by the Rules Committee, in the form of resolutions, requiring a vote of the delegates, and/or recommendations, not requiring a vote. No general resolution requiring the expenditure of funds by the Fraternity shall be presented to the floor of the Convention unless it shall first have been examined by the Budget and Development Committee and the estimated cost thereof included in the proposed budget.

XIII

In general meetings the President shall call upon the committee chairmen in rotating order. Resolutions of a legislative character shall be termed General Resolutions; all others shall be termed Special Resolutions. Resolutions may be initiated by delegates in general meetings whereupon, if it is a General Resolution, it shall be referred to the appropriate committee for consideration.

<u>XIV</u>

Resolutions shall be adopted by a majority vote of accredited delegates present, unless specified otherwise, as for the establishment of chapters (Article IV, Section 2), the termination of chapters (Article V, Section 1), disciplinary action for hazing (Article X, Section 1), or amendments to the Constitution (Article XIII). Votes shall be called for by voice; or by standing, if the decision is in doubt; or by roll call, if requested by any delegate.

XV

Undergraduates desiring membership on the Executive Council must present a letter of under 500 words to the Nominations Committee before its first meeting. The letter must state the candidate's qualifications, including reasons for seeking election, positions held in chapter, college and community and other pertinent information. An undergraduate need not attend the Convention to be considered for such office. Only one applicant from any chapter will be considered by the Nominations Committee. The Nominations Committee will select the five most qualified candidates to be presented to the Convention. If a candidate serves on the Nominations Committee, he or she will be recused from the discussion. If there are fewer than five candidates, the Nominations Committee shall present all candidates to the Convention. At an appropriate time, the candidates will have an opportunity to address the Convention for a maximum of two minutes. If a candidate is not present, a member of the Nominations Committee shall read the candidate's letter to the Convention. The Convention will then vote to elect two undergraduate members of the Executive Council by popular vote, with the third-highest recipient of votes to serve as an alternate undergraduate member of the Executive Council

<u>XVI</u>

These rules may be amended by a majority vote of accredited delegates present and shall remain in force until superceded. Any rule may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the accredited delegates present.

The board of trustees

should meet at least two or more times a year with at least one such meeting to be held at their respective chapter houses. Such procedure will permit the board of trustees to maintain close contact with the affairs of the undergraduates and of the house and to review communications between the Executive Council or Convention, and the chapter."; and be it further

President McKeon welcomed all present to the Summer board meeting and opened with an invitation for a motion to accept the minutes of the March 5, 2022 meeting. Brother LaPanne

moved accordingly, and Brother Szynkowski seconded. The motion passed, and the minutes were confirmed.

President McKeon then presented the **Report of the President**. He reviewed the SWOT analysis from the December joint board summit, and noted that the Fraternity board would worth with the Foundation board on future goal-setting efforts. He then presented an outline of the day's agenda.

From there, Brother Zepp gave the **Report of the Finance and Audit Committee**. He began by reviewing the unaudited financial statements for the period ending June 30, 2022, noting that the Fraternity had ended the fiscal year in a positive place relative to expectations. He presented the 2022-23 budget and compared it against the prior year's statements.

Next, Brother Zepp reviewed the outstanding chapter assessments, and Brother Fox discussed the possibility of allowing willing alumni associations to assume their chapter's debt. Brother Zepp pointed out that the Budget and Development Committee of the 178th Convention would be reviewing a proposed increase in the membership tax.

Brother Szynkowski moved to consider a set of invoices totaling \$26,955.05 uncollectible. Brother Fox seconded, and the motion passed.

Brother Zepp moved to adjust the doubtful account balance accordingly, to \$72,059.24. Brother LaPanne seconded, and the motion passed.

Next, Brother LaPanne presented the **Report from FRMT**. He informed the board that we should be prepared for a rate increase, and recommended that we evaluate being a leader in developing practices around single-tier membership. He noted that FRMT is considering offering new insurance products, and that we may evaluate those once we know more.

Following Brother LaPanne's report, the meeting was adjourned for lunch at 11:57am EDT.

At 1:05pm EDT, the meeting was reconvened.

President McKeon reopened the meeting with the **Report of the Nominations and Credentials Committee**, including an outline of current Executive Council terms and the strategy for recruiting new members. Brother Senchak discussed the needs of the Foundation board.

Next, Brother Hollis presented the **Report of the Bylaws, Policy, and Governance Committee**. The committee moved adoption of the proposed Policy on Academics and Intellectual Engagement. Brother Platner questioned the lack of a fixed GPA requirement for campuses that did not report all-mens or all-campus GPAs. President McKeon asked whether we could add

such a requirement, and Brother Hollis noted that such wording was struck from the proposed policy by the Committee on New Business at the prior Convention. Brother Rasmussen recommended adding a fixed 3.0 GPA requirement as a fallback and suggested amended wording accounting for that. Brother Szynkowski moved to amend the motion to incorporate Brother Rasmussen's changes, and the amendment passed.

There being no further discussion, President McKeon called for a vote. The motion passed, and the Policy on Academics and Intellectual Engagement was adopted.

Next, Brother Szynkowski presented the **Report of the Awards Committee**. He extended his thanks to the committee for their contributions.

The committee moved to award Brother Hal Ochsner, Xi '57, the Distinguished Alumni Service Award. Brother Brayboy asked whether the Brown Award might be more appropriate, and the room generally agreed. Brother Szynkowski made a new motion to instead award Brother Ochsner the David A. B. Brown Distinguished Alumnus Award, Brother Platner seconded, and the motion passed.

The committee moved to award Brothers Matt Ross, Pi '86, and Jim Cornacchia, Pi '86, the Distinguished Alumni Service Award. The motion passed.

The committee moved to award Brother Eldred Halsey, Lambda '58, the David A. B. Brown Distinguished Alumnus Award. The motion passed, and the Board thanked Brother Eskenazi for his letter of recommendation.

Next, Brother Rasmussen gave the **Report of the Education and Development Committee**, giving an overview of the programming for the Leadership Institute and panel discussions for the upcoming Convention.

Following that, Mr. Smith presented the **Report of the Director of Growth**. He described the goals of the new Committee on Growth and Expansion and gave a summary of the work the committee had done since its formation, including:

- revising documentation,
- reviewing policies and drawing comparisons with those of other similar organizations,
- developing an expansion timeline, and
- drafting a policy on legacy members.

The Committee on Growth and Expansion moved to adopt the Policy on Legacies. The motion passed, and the policy was adopted.

President McKeon asked to check in on a few specific chapters, and Brother Fox gave an update on those.

The meeting then moved to the **Report of the Executive Director**. Brother Fox gave an update on the upcoming oral history project, including some targeted start times for the effort.

Then Mr. Oeschle gave the **Report of the Director of Chapter Services**. He presented his methodology for chapter evaluations, along with some preliminary reports based on the past year's chapter visits and self-reports. He described the upcoming chapter success coaching program, a new addition to the existing chapter advisor program, and gave the Board a copy of the description of the Chapter Success Coach position.

There being no old business, President McKeon moved on to New Business.

President McKeon moved to appoint Brothers Platner, Zepp, and Hollis as Executive Council delegates to the 178th Convention. Brother LaPanne seconded, and the motion passed.

President McKeon announced that the Fall board meeting would be held on November 12th in Seattle, WA, and the Spring meeting on March 4th in Bethesda, MD.

There being no further business, Brother McKeon asked for a motion to adjourn. Brother Platner so moved, and Brother Szynkowski seconded. The motion passed, and the meeting was **adjourned** at 3:18pm EDT.

Next, Brother Zepp gave the **Report of the Budget and Audit Committee**. He updated the board on the timing of the upcoming audit, noting that the Foundation's audit would take priority, with the Fraternity's taking place afterward. He mentioned that there would likely be a special meeting to review the results of the audit if it came in between regular meetings. Brother Zepp then reviewed chapter assessments, remarking that the numbers are in line with what we'd expect for this time of year.

Brother Fox reviewed the state of the Beta Beta chapter, and recommended social probation if they haven't established a payment plan by the end of the current term. He added that the Budget Committee (possibly in collaboration with the Bylaws Committee) would discuss making the policy on nonpayment more specific.

Brother Zepp then showed off a breakdown of where the Fraternity's income comes from, highlighting that the vast majority comes from Undergraduates. He suggested that we explore better ways to communicate with the chapters how that money is used for their benefit.

Following that, Brother Platner gave the **Report of the Nominations Committee**. He reviewed the committee's work cleaning recruiting lists and pipelines, and actively recruiting. He updated the board on the committee's goal to review a new candidate for the Executive Council, and chose Steven Malinski, Epsilon Iota '09.

Brother Platner moved to appoint Brother Malinksi to the Executive Council until the next Convention. Brother Szynkowski seconded, and the motion passed.

RESOLVED: that the amount of \$17,000 be set aside from the general assets of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity in a separate bank account to be known as "the set aside account of Psi Upsilon Fraternity." And be it further

RESOLVED: that said amount of \$17,000 may be used only for the following purposes: Religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes, loans on local chapter housing,

or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals; and for scholarships, student loans, leadership and citizenship schools and services, and similar purposes.

Brother Miller moved that the board accept the resolution. Brother Turkette seconded, and the motion passed.

Finally, Brother Fox and President McKeon discussed some of the logistics of the upcoming Convention.

There being no further business, President McKeon called for a motion to adjourn. Brother Miller made such a motion, and Brother Hollis seconded the motion. The motion passed, and the meeting was adjourned at 5:50pm EDT.

DELTA, New York University (1837)

ZETA, Dartmouth College (1842)

In the fall, we had the largest rush class since fall 2019, with 32 new members from diverse backgrounds bringing unique interests to the organization. We also had a great term in regard to brotherhood events including a weekend-long cookout during Homecoming, paint balling, attending Brother's sporting events (e.g., ice hockey games) and other fun events. We also brought in the Women's Initiative for Self-Empowerment (WISE), a local nonprofit that specializes in gender-based violence, to discuss inclusivity in our house. WISE leads the Upper Valley to end gender-based violence through survivor-centered advocacy, prevention, education and mobilization for social change. This is one step, among many, we have taken to make our space safer and more inclusive for all guests. Over Homecoming weekend, we had over 30 alumni in town. The 48-hour cookout was great for the alumni, as it gave them a chance to eat and converse with the present undergraduates. Dartmouth sponsored a family weekend which was terrific, with many parents of brothers and pledges coming by the fraternity to meet members of our organization. Lastly, we had a great formal event at Salt Hill Pub in Lebanon, NH. Our social chairs organized this event and over 150 people attended! Many of our brothers are currently holding Honors status and anticipate graduating with honors this coming spring.

Ryan Irving, a Marine veteran, put on a great Memorial Day event where he discussed the history of military service at Dartmouth. He spoke with a retired Marine general and hosted an exhibit in Rauner Library where he included historical helmets/documents/books/images from Dartmouth. Ryan runs the Veterans' Association at Dartmouth and has been instrumental in welcoming new veterans to campus. Because of Ryan, we now have another veteran who is a pledge (sophomore) this year. Dartmouth's club ice hockey team has six (6) Psi U's on it and they have been exceptional--boasting an 8-1 record this fall and being ranked in the top-20 in the nation. Many of our brothers are currently in Honors' status and it is anticipated they will graduate with honors from the college this coming Spring. Many of our brothers will graduate with honors from the college this coming Spring and hold honors currently.

In October, we organized a "Pie-a-Brother/Sister" event with Alpha Phi held in the Dartmouth College library. Ryan Irving organized this event (spending about 4 hours) and 15-20 brothers then participated for an hour each. Students could come to the stand and pay \$5 to "pie" a brother or purchase a number of baked goods provided by Alpha Phi sorority. We raised \$650 for the Alpha Phi Foundation that supports women's heart health. Also, in October, Ryan Irving organized a charity ping pong tournament with Kappa Kappa Gamma. Teams consisting of one brother and one sister could enter the tournament for \$20. We raised a total of \$600 for FORT (which stands for fortitude), an on-campus nonprofit providing access to affordable mental health care. Chapter members spent about 20 hours in the planning and execution of this event. Will Cook-Healy and Rami Sumaida served at the Hartford Dismas House (6 hours – 3 per brother) baking food for convicts staying locally in a half-way house. Joe Riley, Will Cook-Healy, Henry Lowe, Will Toth, Chase Alvarado-Anderson and Ryan Irving (12 hours – 2 per brother) served at the Hanover Community Kitchen cooking meals for local families for local families. Lastly, we raised a significant amount of money (\$5750) for the Children's Hospital at

Dartmouth (CHaD) Hero event. This is a road race where people pay to walk/run a 5K or half-marathon. We had five (5) brothers participate in the half marathon (2.5 hours per brother) and 11 brothers ran the 5k event (30 minutes per brother). This is an event that we do each and every single year.

PSI, Hamilton College (1843)

In the fall, we brought in a mental health speaker, Ross Szabo, to the Chapel for programming about mental health for teenagers and young adults. We held our bi-annual formal at the Corral in Morrisville, New York. The chapter also held our annual career day where alumni have panels regarding gearing up for our postgraduate career. The Psi chapter had 17 people on Dean's List.

We hosted our annual Pie-a-Psi event on Parents' Weekend during the football game. We had music playing and charged \$5 for people to throw whip cream pies at brothers faces. We raised over \$800 for the Kelberman Center for Autism in Utica, New York. Shifts were 30-minutes and each brother racked up three hours of service for the event.

XI, Wesleyan University (1843)

During the fall semester, the Xi focused on rebuilding after the lockdown for Covid-19. With that in mind, the year started off with the first ever all women of color bench, and the first ever Chinese woman as Archon in the history of the Xi. Strengthening our alumni relations, we were able to coordinate the first Homecoming celebration for Psi U since quarantine. We held a well-attended chapter meeting with brothers, old and young, discussing the current state of the Xi, followed by the Wesleyan vs. Williams football game, where the brothers cheered together over the grill and beers. After two years, the Xi were finally able to have a composite made of the current brothers and have a professional cleaning service come and make the Xi squeaky clean. We also got a completely new set of chairs and a main floor speaker system for our main floor, which allowed brothers to eat Chique Chaque and hang out together more comfortably. The Xi had a large presence on campus and were able to throw large parties, open to the entire

university. Rush season had the well-known events for femme-identifying rushes, queer-identifying rushes, and the POC-identifying rushes. Within the Brotherhood, Garnet vs. Gold, our semester-long competitions kept us bonded. We played Live-Action *Among Us* and our famous *Assassin Game*. We brought in 11 new Pledges from the '25 class this fall. Overall, it was a very fun and rewarding fall semester, even though many brothers are currently abroad. The small, but mighty, crew has been able to sustain the brotherhood here at the Xi.

During our first fall semester unaffected by Covid-19, the Xi were happy to dive back into extracurriculars and various activities across our now lively campus. We are very proud to announce that this semester, Neo Fleurimond '24 (Athletic Czar and Chique-Chaque Steward) founded Wesleyan University's first all-black music group called Black Raspberry. Although this group extends beyond the Xi, we are excited to acknowledge that many of their artists are current brothers, including Kailer Brothers '25, Lauren Berthoumieux '25, Kofi Agyei '25, Keren Mikanda '25 (Rush Chair), Pelumi Sokumbi '25, Ayer Richmond '24 (Social Chair), and Christina Onuzuruike '24. We also had a few brothers participate in student comedy groups on campus, such as Keren Mikanda '25 and Chad White '23 in *Gag Reflex*, as well as Kofi Agyei '24 in *Juicebox*.

In the fall, we hosted a concert that raised money for Wesleyan's first ever all-black band *Black Raspberry*. In total we have raised around \$1,300 and it is still rising. It took about 60 hours to put the concert together. In October, Brothers Lauren and Jack Vigue, as Presidents of WestCo, hosted a benefit concert to raise funds for Middletown Mutual Aid. It raised about \$500 and took around 60 hours to complete. The Xi chapter supported the Psi U Cares program through fundraising and donating funds to local Middletown food pantries and Middletown Mutual Aid.

This spring, the Xi made a lot of progress in returning to pre-COVID activities and numbers. We had a lot of successes this semester, and we would like to acknowledge that it began with our first black woman as Archon in the history of the Xi. Along with the rest of the bench, the Xi worked diligently to strengthen our alumni relations, increase the number of new brothers through rush and pledging, and emphasize a lot of growth with our community service. We had a very successful rush season this semester with almost 60 applicants, and we narrowed it down to a 15-member pledge class. This is the largest pledge class since before COVID, and we are all very excited to welcome them to the Brotherhood. We were lucky to be able to host a lot of events in the house this year, most notably a benefit concert for the Wesleyan Refugee Project which featured Wesleyan's first all-black music group, started by one of our very own brothers. In terms of Brotherhood bonding this semester, we welcomed back many brothers from abroad and were very excited to have them back at the Xi for picnics, games, and study time together. Additionally, we have worked closely with other fraternities on campus, notably Eclectic Society, concerning our individual group efforts in maintaining positive frat culture on campus. We found our conversations to be very helpful and we look forward to continuing them in the future! Overall, this was a very successful semester at the Xi, and we look forward to continuing this progression next semester.

The Xi was very happy to continue many of our extracurricular activities this spring, with many of our brothers leading multiple organizations on campus. This semester, Neo Fleurimond '24 continued his efforts in building the first all-black music group called *Black Raspberry*, and we

are excited to share that the group, which includes multiple members of the Brotherhood, was voted to be one of the openers for our Spring Fling (the first Spring Fling since before COVID!). Additionally, we would like to highlight brothers who shared successful Senior Art Theses, so congratulations to Tommy Graves '23, Jolexis DeJesus '23 and Archie Caride '23! We would also like to highlight two (2) graduating seniors who are varsity athletes—Nick Dillon '23 and Phoebe Snyder '23 in Swimming & Diving, Nick Dillon '23 in Crew and Shanay Sanghavi '23 in Squash. We have a few brothers who are involved in community engagement on campus who teach to elementary schoolers after school for Wesleyan's Cardinal Kids program—Jack Vigue '25 (Coordinator for the program) and Grace Warner-Haakmat '24. Our academic chairman, Jack Edelman, and previous academic chairman, Marc Hamati, hosted a resume workshop at which brothers were given a chance to have their resumes edited and improved. Our recruitment chairmen, Ryan Lietz and Eli Alter, and our social chairmen, Hunter Lawson and Tom Warzynski, planned and executed several fun events for potential new members. In addition to the mental health workshop and the alumni career workshop, our chapter also participated in workshops geared towards professional development and diversity, equity, and inclusion. In March, the Center for Career and Professional Development presented to our brothers. They taught us about the resources available on campus and explored strategies in the job search process. This event increased our preparedness for the sometimes-daunting task of applying to jobs and internships. In terms of diversity, equity and inclusion, our fraternity hosted a workshop called "Inclusive Classroom" from Lehigh SPEAK, which taught us how to promote a more welcoming environment for LGBTQIA+ students. Our brothers posed many important questions and learned together how to support a more inclusive classroom.

As previously mentioned, we have seen a 10% increase in brothers named to the Dean's List. Austin Tarpey and Jack Lightfine, two juniors, are part of Lehigh's ROTC program. Jake Feuerstein, freshman, is participating in Sickle Cell research and will be continuing that research in Africa over the summer. Connor McDowell, freshman, will be studying abroad this summer in Pforzheim, Germany focusing on Industrial and System Engineering. Chris Gerazounis, junior and former president of the Eta Chapter, was named a Rossin Junior Fellow. These fellows work as student mentors for the P.C. Rossin College of Engineering and Applied Sciences.

As a chapter, we executed and participated in many philanthropic and service events that enriched the Lehigh and Bethlehem communities this spring. Our philanthropy and community service chairs, Ben Ciancio and Shane Neyer organized many events for our brothers to participate in. Our secretary, Jason Kim, organized a collaboration between the mental health clothing brand "Happy Jack" and Lehigh University. Psi Upsilon and Delta Chi were contributors to this collaboration. A sweatshirt and a t-shirt were designed and sold to Lehigh students, with funds going to support the

mental health efforts of Happy Jack. Happy Jack supports Active Minds, Child Mind Institute, Born this Way Foundation, Runway of Dreams, Riley's Dance, JaneStrong, Lean on Me, Denver University, American Cancer Society and Release Recovery Foundation. In April, our chapter hosted a barbeque where students could pick up their clothes. This event produced \$2,714 in sales which would be a donation of \$407. Our chapter also organized a charity March Madness basketball bracket. The entry price was \$5 a bracket with proceeds going to the Special Olympics. The winner of the bracket received a \$50 Goose gift card, a local sandwich shop in Bethlehem. \$365 dollars were raised and donated to the Special Olympics.

We volunteered in the Victory House project, in which we helped cook and serve meals for displaced workers in Bethlehem. Brothers went weekly to cook for and support workers in need of south Bethlehem. We had 15 brothers involved across three (3) weeks for three (3) hours each week. In March, our brothers worked a booth at the Relay for Life event at Grace Hall. Relay for Life aims to raise funds to increase cancer survival rates and improve the quality of life for cancer patients. Every Greek life organization ran a table. Our brothers enjoyed supporting the cause. This event lasted eight (8) hours and shifts of four (4) brothers were implemented. In April, our chapter volunteered at the Spring Fling, hosted by the Community Service Office, which is an event that invited the families of south Bethlehem to participate in carnival games. Our brothers ran a table with arts and crafts. During this event, we ran a table of arts and crafts for the families of south Bethlehem. We helped kids create pirate hats for them to wear as they visited the other carnival games around the Broughal Middle School field. This event lasted three (3) hours with shifts of four (4) brothers at a time. Our brothers also participated in the annual "Trashion Show" hosted by the Lehigh Office of Sustainability. We constructed an outfit made of sustainable materials to promote sustainability and one of our brothers walked the outfit down a runway. Through this event we learned about the importance of recycling, sustainability and the need to take good care of our planet. Our outfit won the category of "Most Stylish". Twenty (20) of our brothers participated. In collaboration with the Kappa Delta sorority on campus, our chapter participated in their "So You Think You K∆n Dance" fundraiser to support the fight against child abuse. In this event our new members prepared a dance to be performed at the event and donated to the cause. We also participated in the Alpha Phi Heartthrob Pageant, an event that included rounds of lip syncing, interviews and dancing. This event supported women's heart health through raising money. Five (5) of our brothers participated.

Our new member service project this semester consisted of volunteering at the Eastern Pennsylvania Down Syndrome Center. Our new member class volunteered at the Eastern Pennsylvania Down Syndrome Center's annual Run for Down Syndrome 5k, directing runners on the course and assisting with registration. This organization aims to raise funds for Down Syndrome research and supports people with down syndrome and their families. In addition to helping run the race, our new members also raised \$165 through a 50/50 raffle. Fifteen (15) of our brothers volunteered in addition to the donations. Many of our alumni have made donations to the Psi U Cares program. The multitude of service opportunities we participated in this semester taught us to be grateful and the value in giving back to the community.

Last spring, we initiated our largest spring class since 2018. We had three (3) brothers attend the annual OFSL leadership Summit. We hosted a large party for alumni over summer break, as well as our annual Homecoming brunch. We hosted our annual Winter Formal in the chapter house. We also hosted speakers from different Penn organizations to give us talks on topics such as violence prevention and fire safety. We organized several brotherhood dinners as well as a "Brotherood Debates" event to encourage brotherhood and intellectual curiosity.

Max Freeman and Nicholas Hamilton were TAs for the Financial Literacy Community Project, a special class that pairs UPenn students with Philadelphia middle school / high school students. Several brothers achieved Dean's List for the 2021-2022 academic year.

In February, we hosted our annual "TriHop" pancake and rose sale with Tri Delta in October. This fall, we had the largest new member class since 2018! We are expecting 12 new initiates on January 6, 2023. We also have three (3) additional signees expected to pledge in the spring of 2023, while we continue to rush and hope for more. During the summer of 2022, about 10 chapter alumni came over with interior paint supplies and repainted the hallways with our chapter members to revive the interior walls of our chapter house. We held our annual Founders Day at the university women's club in the fall of 2022. National board members attended, including Tom Fox! This quarter we implemented weekly "study table" sessions where brothers could study with each other to help generate better grades.

Jacob Kim made the Dean's List for academic year of 2021-2022. Yonas Mekennon was admitted into the Informatics degree program, received a return offer to Microsoft as a project manager and made the Dean's List for spring 2022. Marvin Lin completed an internship at Blue Origin and received a return offer for the spring. Robert Burris earned a software engineer internship at Google and accepted a full-time job offer. Ryan Douglas began his duties as a research assistant in the electrical engineering department. James Kim was accepted into a business degree in marketing at UW.

This quarter, members attended a local trail cleanup project and we are expecting to do more of these trail cleanups in the upcoming year. Brothers participated in the "Alpha Phi-fa Soccer Tournament which raised \$300. Brothers also participated in the Delta Zeta football tournament where \$200 was raised. We also donated \$100 to the Alpha Chi Omega fries feed philanthropy. We are planning for the "Mac and Cheese and Puppies" feed coming up in the winter of 2023! All proceeds will go to the Treehouse for Kids organization and the estimated donations for this year are \$1200.

In the spring, the members of the Theta Theta chapter excelled academically and philanthropically on the University of Washington's campus. During this quarter the chapter achieved an average GPA of 3.52 - a significant increase from the last few years. Finally, the chapter has been making great efforts to be more present on campus, with many new members

participating in intramural sports, joining clubs and hosting group exercise sessions at the university gym.

Andy Steiner made the Dean's List, was accepted into psychology major and hired as a research assistant at UW BRAIN labs. Josh Scott was hired for a project management mechanical engineering internship at AirReps. Jacob Kim was hired as an intern at Philips. Marvin Lin was hired as an intern at Blue Origin during the spring and at Earnest Fintech for the upcoming summer. Nick McClure made the Dean's List and was hired at PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC). Taran Bains made the Dean's List and had the most improved GPA. Shaaz Charania made the Dean's List and had the second most improved GPA.

We hosted our annual event called "Mac and Cheese and Puppies" where we made our own Mac and Cheese and brought our own dogs to the chapter house. We charged \$5 for entry and food, and greek and non-greek friends, family and students to support the organization the money is going to - Treehouse for Kids. Including set up, clean up and participation during the event, about 20 members were involved for a total of 40 service hours. Due to everyone's help, the chapter raised \$350! Ten (10) brothers participated in a program led by Upper Deck Golf that converts stadiums into golf courses to support the organization Stand Up 2 Cancer. Our members helped set up the golf courses and work the front desk, leading to a total of 20 service hours completed.

To support PsiU Cares, we reinstated our health and wellness chair, which was previously a vacant position. This quarter, one of our members, Jacob Kim, felt passionate to take up the role. Jacob has provided an open ear and one on one meetings with all the brothers in the house to talk about mental health issues.

ZETA ZETA, University of British Columbia (1935)

In the fall of 2022, our chapter initiated 10 brothers to our chapter. At the University of British Columbia, the Greek system has been slower than in past years, with fewer rushees coming to events than we previously seen. Despite this, we found 10 great fits for our chapter that have a lot of potential to lead this place in the coming years. In terms of academics, over the fall 2022 and spring 2023 semesters, our chapter had a 3.4 GPA, with 12 brothers who made the Dean's List. Our academics are something we pride ourselves on, and as a chapter, we plan various study sessions with our own brothers, or other sororities to encourage strong performance. The Zeta Zeta chapter had a successful Founder's Day in November, with more alumni coming than in past years. Due to the increase in attendance, we are planning to host our next Founder's Day outside of our chapter house at a larger venue to accommodate the increased number of alumni who are attending.

In the fall, we hosted our annual philanthropy "Pie-A-Psi", where guests were given a chance to donate and throw a pie in the face of the brother of their choice. All proceeds were donated to the Movember Foundation. The event consisted of donations of varying amounts, starting at \$10 per pie and an additional \$5 per extra "topping", which included eggs, chocolate sauce and more. The vast majority of our chapter, including more than 40 brothers, participated in the event and only those who could not make it due to conflicting plans were excused. In total, we had over 70 participants come to our house, and with some generous donations, we were able to raise just shy of \$\$2,400.

In the spring of 2023, we did not have a pledge class due to a lack of interest, but this was the case for many other fraternities at our school. Looking ahead to fall 2023 rush, our school's IFC and our chapter are both coming up with new strategies to implement to improve the number of rushees we have coming to events and bring in a big pledge class. To conclude the school year, we held our formal on Vancouver Island in Victoria, which is a ferry ride away from our campus. It was a great success with the brothers and guests concluding it was our best formal in years.

Mirren Buchanan, Efe Demir and Torrin Pataki were on the Dean's List the past semester, with Mirren receiving the Science Scholars Award and Ege Yakar receiving the Outstanding International Student Award. Ryan Shoji, Alex Lassooij, Finn Johnson, Justin Ou and Mirren Buchanan were recipients of various Psi Upsilon Scholarship Awards.

This spring we ran our annual flip cup tournament "Flip Cupsilon" as well as a raffle. We charged \$60/team of four (4) and \$2/raffle tickets. We had 10 teams sign up and play, along with many more people there to support the event and buy raffle tickets. We were able to get a few companies to donate gift cards to the raffle, including the Old Spaghetti Factory, Body Energy Club and Gold's Gym. All money raised went to UNICEF Canada in order to support earthquake relief efforts in Syria and Turkey. We raised a total of \$800 through team sign-ups and raffle sales. This total was doubled to \$1600 because UNICEF matched all donations. Including setup and clean-up time, the event ran a total of three (3) hours with 30 brothers involved for a total of 90 service hours. In total for the year, we raised over \$4000 for charity. Throughout the year, we ensure we have brothers representing our chapter at all sorority and fraternity philanthropy events. Some examples of events we have been a part of include Delta Gamma's "Gammies", where we placed 1st in the video-making competition, and Kappa Sigma's fashion show philanthropy.

Mental health is a topic that our chapter takes very seriously, and our chapter took an active role in supporting the Psi U Cares program through various initiatives and contributions. We recognized the importance of this program in making a positive impact on our community and we are committed to playing our part. First and foremost, we actively promoted awareness of the Psi U Cares program within our chapter and among our members. We educated ourselves about the program's mission, goals, and the specific ways it aimed to assist those in need. By fostering a culture of compassion and empathy, we encouraged our members to actively engage and participate in the program's activities. We have implemented a health and wellness chair to our roster of officers, as we believe it is a crucial role that is needed to help our brothers find support and resources when they are facing challenges. The money that we raise in our philanthropy events goes towards men's mental health through the Movember Foundation. We are also actively thinking of new ways in which we can do more as a chapter to build on the foundation that is the Psi U Cares program.

EPSILON NU, Michigan State University (1943)

This fall, the Epsilon Nu chapter had a successful and productive semester and had a large presence on and off campus at Michigan State University. Academically, our Epsilon Nu brothers earned one of the top cumulative GPAs in the MSU Greek system. With 124 active members, the chapter boasts the second highest GPA (3.22) for all fraternity men at Michigan State. In addition to that, the chapter scored higher than the average for all MSU students, higher than the average of all MSU men and higher than the average for all fraternity men. We hosted our annual Fall Formal event in Toronto, Ontario, which over 200 members attended. In addition to formal, the chapter hosted many social events throughout the semester, all with a great turnout. Ensuring the safety and well-being of its members and guests is a top priority for the Epsilon Nu Chapter of Psi Upsilon. To that end, we have taken several steps to manage risk at social events during the fall 2022 semester, and we continue to do so proudly. The Epsilon Nu chapter also partook in a variety of intramural sports, including hockey, lacrosse, softball and soccer. At the time of this report, our hockey team is headed to the championship game for the inter-fraternal hockey league on campus. Lastly, yet very importantly, the chapter initiated a fall class of 27 new members who demonstrated what it takes to be a brother of Psi Upsilon. Overall, the Epsilon Nu chapter had a successful fall semester in almost every single aspect.

The Epsilon Nu chapter is proud to have taken part in several philanthropy events. The chapter raised over \$10,000 in the fall, largely attributed to our annual "Oktoberfest" event. For this event, sorority members sign up with teams of 10, buy shirts and play games. The profit from the shirts go toward the foundation. Over 700 sorority members attended, along with the entire fraternity, so all of the brothers worked to make sure that the event was set up and run correctly. Oktoberfest proceeds were raised for The Rainbow Connection and, this fall, we sponsored Shaden, a nine-year-old boy from the Lansing area diagnosed with cancer. With the help of our donations, we were able to send Shaden to Disney World and Universal studios in January. We also have plans to host a "Winterfest" event this spring, in hopes of raising money towards the clinic where a close family member of one of our active brothers is being treated for brain cancer. In terms of social events, the chapter had a lively fall semester. This fall we also had over 40 brothers volunteer at the Cristo Rey Community Center on different dates. Throughout the fall, brothers contributed by helping neighbors in the vicinity of our house with tasks like raking leaves and more. Additionally, we held six (6) large philanthropy events in which we sold tickets to events at bars in East Lansing and had the profits go to different charities, all with extremely high attendance.

In spring 2023, we overhauled our rush advertising with new flyer designs and had 10 pledges initially, which was the third highest on campus. We had the annual Alumni Weekend with similar events to Founders Weekend and raised \$4,200 for hosting Convention this summer! We had another weekend mountain retreat and our Spring Social, as well as weekly bros talks to facilitate connection among the active brotherhood. We also wrote new meeting policy and scholarship plan documents to address issues that had occurred in the past and focused on small events to build relationships among the chapter. We continued many events from the fall as well as adding some new things, and we are happy with the positive direction of our chapter over the last two semesters.

For the spring semester, we had 13 brothers reported on the Dean's list. Charlotte Wehner was accepted into Stanford for her PhD program. Ryan Kelly was named author for a paper submitted to IEEE PIMRC Competition for Smart Stadium VIP. Jade Spooner was the Programming sublead for VGDev game *Outcasts*. Elisa Miller was a WIE scholarship recipient from Rockwell Automation, earned the Hampton Roads Community Foundation Scholarship, was a member of Eta Kappa Nu (HKN) - ECE Honor Society, served as a HIVE Peer Instructor, served as the HKN ECE Junior Lab Supplies Chair and hosted philanthropy events.

To start the year off, the Chi Delta chapter faced challenges due to Duke no longer allowing Greek organizations to have housing sections on campus. Additionally, we have been at our smallest active membership in recent history, totaling just nine (9) active brothers. Everyone has pitched in to contribute to the fraternity's perseverance and success this semester. In September, representatives from the chapter dedicated time to interfacing with members of Duke's administration, resulting in the chapter being allowed to keep some board games in our common room, which have helped foster interaction with the residential community around us. The chapter also gifted its foosball table to the Duke Center for Sexual and Gender Diversity (CSGD) for the year, in order to allow others to enjoy it. In early October, the Chi Delta held its annual Homecoming celebration for alumni. Over board games, karaoke and a foosball tournament, the current active brothers and alumni connected. Not only did he help carry the success of the fraternity this semester, but he also brought musical performances to the Duke community. Payton Schubel (2023) has been a member of Quizbowl this semester and served as the Editor of European Literature for the Quizbowl Set ARCADIA 2022. She is also student staff manager at the Co-Lab, a space on Duke's campus dedicated to technical and creative innovation.

In the spring, the Chi Delta chapter hosted an ice skating rush event at the Orange County Sportsplex in Hillsborough, NC for the first time. The event had a high turnout, surpassing all other rush events this semester, and was considered a success. In April, the chapter hosted an Alumni Weekend event that was attended by more than a dozen alumni from various years of the chapter. Activities during the weekend included a foosball tournament in the common room and a group dinner at Kurama, a hibachi restaurant in Durham. The chapter also hosted a mixer with Chi Omega, another sorority at Duke, in the Psi U common room. Payton Schubel worked as a director at the Duke Co-Lab makerspace, where she directed a team of other student volunteers and helped patrons to use tools such as wood cutters and sticker printers.

Kaitlyn Choi, Kyndall Peyton and Nish Wangneo volunteered for KVille Cleanup, where they helped to clean up trash after a Duke basketball game.

EPSILON IOTA, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (1982)

This Fall, we hosted an alumni reunion BBQ and various other events that had over 40 people in attendance. Boffer was a very popular rush event, with a great many members, alumni, potential new members and the entire football team present. Multiple brothers made the Dean's List for commendable scholarship. Multiple brothers received the Rensselaer Leadership Award for outstanding academic and personal achievements. One brother received the Academic Excellence Award for commendable scholarship. One brother scored a point in the annual Cornell Kendo tournament. One brother was recently elected to the Executive Board of the local Interfraternity Council.

We served the community various ways for an average of 13 hours per member. We conducted a Litter Pick-up in Troy, New York (18 hours) and also had participation from several local alumni. We also had brothers participate in letter writing campaign for lonely seniors through the Love for Our Elders organization (2 hours), which is a nonprofit that believes no one should feel alone and fights isolation in senior communities through handwritten letters, videos, and stories. We also raised \$13.50 for the Ronald McDonald House of Fun can tab donations. Fraternity Sorority Commons hosted Freshman Move-In and brothers donated their time for a total of 18 hours. We had brothers provide 62 hours of service to RPI Ambulance/EMS. Brothers also participated in the "Service Day Park Cleanup" hosted by Alpha Phi Omega service fraternity for a total of four (4) hours. Our chapter did not participate in the Psi U Cares program.

In the Spring, the Epsilon Iota chapter worked on our post-COVID foundation and growth. We expanded our Study Hours program to stagger the scheduling to better fit the various demands of the brothers' schedules. This was very successful in creating cooperative study environments for the brothers and friends of the house to connect and work on their schoolwork together, which

made it easier for everyone to ask for and give help on coursework and studying for exams. Our Scholarship Chair worked 1-on-1 with brothers and friends of the house who were struggling with certain classes, and also worked with each student to ensure they were completing the required assignments and communicating with their professors whenever they needed assistance with those assignments. We hosted our annual alumni event, Founder's, in celebration of the chapter's founding and the alumni association's achievements over the past year. We planned and executed various weekly events, including Anime Committee and Board Game Nights, which were incredibly successful in bringing brothers to the house almost every day of the week to spend time together and bond over shared interests.

On St. Patrick's Day, a group of seven (7) brothers spent a combined 20 hours selling various baked good to support the Mohawk Hudson Humane Society. The Humane Society is a local animal shelter that, in addition to caring for many animals who need help, offers many services such as dog training, humane education, animal cruelty investigations, and more. The event raised \$216.36, charging \$1-7 for each baked good. The brotherhood also held a couple Letter Writing events over the course of the semester, writing letters for a total of four (4) hours for the Love for Our Elders organization. This organization sends profiles of their senior residents to groups, so people can write personalized letters to each of the seniors and connect with them better over shared interests. One Saturday in April, several brothers participated in a combined 12 hours of service supporting the Oakwood Community Center, which is a local center committed to bringing together community members, as well as grassroots organizations throughout Troy. One brother also supported Circle K, an international student-led collegiate service organization, with their Feed and Read event for 2.5 hours. Another brother spent a total of 101 hours volunteering as an EMT for two organizations, RPI Ambulance and Colonie EMS. Both organizations are NYS certified transporting EMS agencies. RPI Ambulance is a studentrun volunteer agency providing BLS (Basic Life Support) care, and Colonie EMS is a municipal agency providing both BLS and ALS (Advanced Life Support) care.

This year, our chapter had a member get certified in Mental Health First Aid in order to be able to better support the Psi U Cares program within the chapter, as well as be able to better support brothers and connect them to the proper resources when they need mental health help.

PHI BETA, William & Mary (YEAR)

Our chapter's Fall 2022 rush class was the largest incoming class since being reinstated on campus. We gained six (6) new members and carried out our first initiation ceremony for these new members with our previously initiated brothers and alumni. In November, we held our semiformal with the Psi Upsilon chapter at Christopher Newport University. This was an excellent opportunity to develop further relationships with this nearby chapter and we plan to host further events with them in the future. In addition, we continued hosting social events with a variety of cultural organizations on campus, strengthening our ties with these groups as we move into the spring. We also started a flag football league with the brothers, which played games throughout much of the semester. This was a great time for everyone involved, facilitated teamwork and brought the brotherhood closer together. Professionally, our brothers worked to develop alumni relationships and career opportunities in a number of ways. We paired new and

We would also like to congratulate brothers Michael Herman, Nick Elsberg and Justin Mangis for making the Dean's List this fall. Lastly, we would like to wish the best of luck to Josh Rogers, who will be graduating as a government and data science major, and will be working at Booz Allen Hamilton Consulting.

This spring a group of four (4) brothers participated in several roadside clean-ups hosted by the college's "Service Saturday" program. The brothers also participated in mulching and gardening projects hosted by the school as well. LAMBDA SIGMA, Pepperdine University (1998)

Our chapter's cumulative GPA (3.29) was higher than the IFC Cumulative Average (3.24) and the Undergraduate All-Men Average Cumulative GPA (3.26). Our philanthropy "Psi U Think You Can Dance" (PUTYCD) raised the most money out of any other Greek-led philanthropy on campus by more than \$3,000. It was the most attended philanthropy with over 800 people attending. Our Risk Chair/1st Angelos, Aidan Henegar, organized a program known as "Diversity Diamonds" where active brothers are required to attend a diversity event on campus as a way to incentivize diversity. Our chapter was in good standing with the University. Our chapter held nine (9) service events where we served both our Pepperdine on-campus community and Los Angeles community. These events were organized by our Service Chair, Max Pohlenz. Our chapter held numerous brotherhood events throughout the semester, including bowling, surfing, etc, led by our Brotherhood Chair, Owen Walsh. Our chapter held a formal at the end of the semester organized by our Vice-President, Sebastien Champion, which consisted of about 70 people. This was a great way to celebrate the end of the semester. We had two buses pick everyone up from campus and safely transport us to the venue, which was a studio located in the downtown area. There, we had snacks and a DJ where everyone danced and enjoyed their night up until the buses arrived to take us back to campus. The purpose of these formals is for our brothers to be able to celebrate a successful semester full of hard work and many achievements. While displaying three of our pillars throughout the semester (excellence, leadership, and service), this is a time where we really get to convey and enjoy our fourth and final pillar, brotherhood.

Brothers participated in "Step Forward Day", which is a campus-wide day of volunteering. Together, the brothers helped make over 250 goodie bags and letters for victims of homelessness. Leo Hawke and Max Yong made the Dean's List with exceptional academic performance. Joseph Song was appointed IFC VP of Recruitment.

This year we held our annual and successful philanthropy known as Psi U Think You Can Dance (PUTYCD) in the cafeteria. Our main event is a dance competition between different organizations, both Greek and non-Greek, to raise money for Conquer Paralysis Now (CPN). This is an extremely special philanthropy for our chapter because CPN was started by one of our founding and most notable alumni, Sam Schmidt. Throughout our entire philanthropy week, we tabled in front of the cafeteria all day selling our t-shirts that were designed by our philanthropy chair, Joseph Song. We sold t-shirts for \$25, pit tickets to the dance competition for \$10, and a bundle (shirt and pit ticket) for \$30. To encourage participation, we developed a point system where points can be gained by buying bundles, posting on social media, winning the overall dance competition, etc... While tabling, we organized different events to encourage participation including cornhole, poster decorations and raffle items that would be announced during the main event. This year we were lucky enough to receive donations from local Malibu businesses to include in our raffle. Our philanthropy week culminated with the main event on Friday. This year, PUTYCD was held in the cafeteria and had an attendance of about 800 people. In total, thirteen organizations danced, including our very own Psi U team. At the end of the event, we were able to raise about \$14,000 and continue to raise awareness for CPN!

This semester, our chapter participated in five external philanthropies. We participated in Alpha Phi's "Alpha Phifa" philanthropy that benefited the Alpha Phi Foundation and Women's Heart Health, Delta Gamma's "Anchorsplash" philanthropy that benefited Service for Sight, Kappa Alpha Theta's "KAT at Bat" philanthropy that benefited CASA of Los Angeles and Kappa Alpha Theta Good Program, Kappa Kappa Gamma's "KKG Pickleball" philanthropy that benefited the JED Foundation, and Pi Beta Phi's "Arrowspike" philanthropy that benefited Read, Lead, and Achieve.

ALPHA OMICRON, New Jersey Institute of Technology (1999)

In the fall we had the highest IFC Fraternity GPA for third semester in a row and the 4th highest GPA of any greek organization on campus, including the professional fraternities. Professional development has exploded in importance in our chapter this year. Professional development opportunities we provide include resume reviews, LinkedIn building nights and tutorials on time-management and organization. Several graduating seniors already have jobs lined up an entire semester before graduation. We had the largest fall rush class in recent memory (4 members). Fall is usually light because we cannot rush first-semester freshman. The Alumni Phoenix Banquet returned after a 2-year hiatus due to COVID which allowed for a long day of reminiscing and bonding with alumni and their families. The alumni BOD graciously raised and donated \$1300 to the undergraduate chapter from this banquet. Several members purchased tables and attended other organization's charity dinners and formals. We worked to encourage Greek Unity on campus and growing closer with other organizations. Overall, our members are getting prepared for the job market and we also participated in IFC's intramural sports and activities.

Over half of our chapter was on the Dean's List for the spring 2022 semester and we are expecting another large group of members to be on the list for the fall 2022 semester as well. Stephen Kurilla and Matthew Stickles participated in research on campus. Stephen Kurilla studies removal techniques for PFAS ("Forever Chemicals") from the environment. Matthew Stickles studies molecular simulation in areas like chemical weapon protection and hydrogen storage. Arjun Venkatesh is an RA on campus. Arjun Venkatesh, Ryan Nollstadt, and Vincent Tews are on the Executive Board for the National Honor Society for Chemical Engineering, Omega Chi Epsilon, which promotes high scholarship, encourages original investigation in chemical engineering and recognizes the valuable traits of character, integrity and leadership. Gabriel Arcanjo, Lucian Mahadeo, Ryan Britten and Matthew Stickles volunteered to help Freshmen move into their dorms over the summer.

We organized several bake sales this semester. We bake the night prior and then table in the Campus Center for six (6) hours to sell the baked goods. Through these bake sales we raised the upwards of \$200 for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. Externally, our brothers donate to other organizations philanthropy events as they see them happening. These include bake sales, raffles, general fundraisers, canned food collections and charity dinners. Our chapter contributes to our International philanthropy when possible. Specifically, we have not volunteered for the Psi U Cares during the fall semester.

In the spring, we had our largest rush class since 2020, with seven (7) new members. Many of our senior brothers, including Vincent Tews, Ryan Nollstadt and Michael Ipri graduated with Latin Honors, Summa Cum Laude. Richard Barros helped start a new Club at NJIT called *NJIT Active*. The purpose of the club is to help facilitate physical activities, such as hiking, skiing and rock climbing, as fun forms of exercise. Throughout our weekly meetings, we gave presentations to highlight the importance of mental health, giving tools and opportunities to all of the brothers.

We hosted a couple more bake sales in the spring semester. We raised \$34 selling baked goods for \$1 each in one event, and we partnered with Alpha Phi Omega for another bake sale. With Alpha Phi Omega, we raised \$292 selling baked goods and delivering them across campus.

SIGMA PHI, St. Francis University (2007)

As a chapter we attained the highest GPA among all other fraternities on campus, this fall. Even though we did not have any new members this semester, we hosted many rush events and continued to invite potential members to events throughout the semester. We hosted our annual Car Smash on the opening weekend as part of the Greek Life opening weekend activities on campus. We raised \$224 for the fraternity at this event. Our next event during the semester was the Greek Life Carnival. This was a part of the Family Weekend activities on campus. We hosted a cornhole event and we had a really good turnout. We hosted many philanthropy events this semester. Some of our brothers attended the Phi Delta Kappa formal which is a local sorority on campus. Overall, we had a very productive and successful semester and we are looking forward to next semester.

Our brothers were very involved in other clubs and activities this semester. Tyler Beckwith continued his job as an RA and was elected Treasurer of the History Club. Tyler was also elected as Philanthropy Chair of the SFU IFC. Nicholas Pillot continued his role as section leader within the SFU marching band and was a member of the Scuba Club.

We had a decent turnout, and many other Greek Life community members came out to support. We charged \$3 per cheese quesadilla, and we offered many sauces to dip in. We had three (3) brothers and one alumni attend for a total of four (4) community service hours. We also helped out with R.E.D Day in October. RED Day is a day of service that is a nationwide event and at Saint Francis it is organized by the sorority Gamma Sigma Sigma. We created our own service project for the event at the Dorothy Day Outreach Center. This is a local outreach center that Tyler Beckwith is employed at and they help those in need in the surrounding area. For our project, we helped paint a porch and touch up other spots around the center. We had four (4) brothers and three (3) of our sweethearts there for a total of 12 service hours. We helped set-up and tear down a Casino Night that was hosted by the Student Activities Organization on Campus. Four (4) brothers and an alumni were in attendance for a total of 20 service hours.
